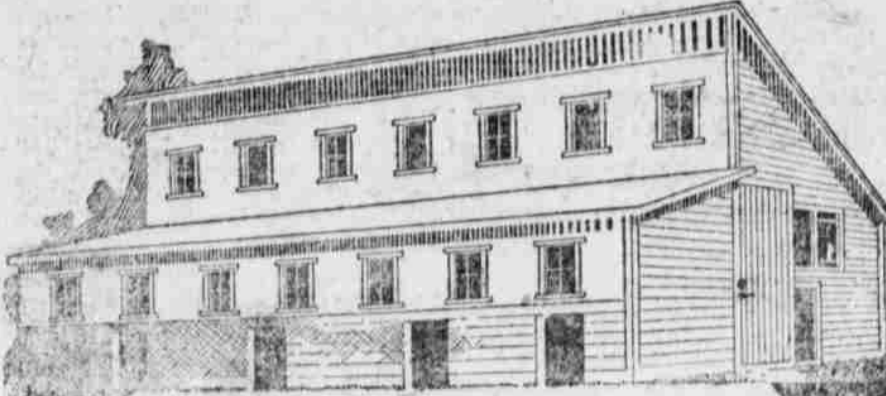

Marks Road to Arnold.

Secretary Fisher, of the Chamber of Commerce, drove to Arnold Tuesday and marked the road from this city to that place. This is known as the Columbus, Broken Bow and North Platte route, and is seventy miles shorter than the Lincoln Highway between Columbus and North Platte. In wet weather it will be a good route. The colors are black, white and black, and all poles between North Platte and Arnold are so marked, and the colors shown at all turns. North Platte signs, telling the distance to North Platte were placed at intervals of ten miles and points where roads cross.

New Market Opens

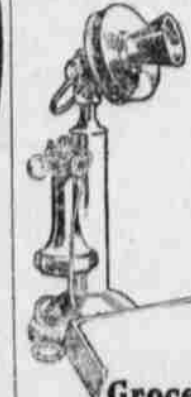
Concerts Begin Next Week.

#### CALVIN WILL SUCCEED MOHLER AS PRESIDENT

The board of directors of the Union Pacific met in New York Wednesday and elected E. C. Calvin vice-president of the Oregon Short Line, president of the Union Pacific to succeed A. L. Mohler.

In speaking of the appointment the Omaha Bee said:  
Mr. Calvin will succeed Mr. Mohler taking office on July 1. He will, as Mr. Mohler has had, have full authority of president, and will not be merely vice-president and general manager as has been suggested. He is to have a free hand in the matter of filling vacancies one of which will be the appointment of a general manager to succeed Mr. Ware, whose resignation is to take effect at the pleasure of the president. This move will perhaps be delayed for some time, until Mr. Calvin gets settled in office.

It is also stated that no further changes in the official personnel at headquarters are contemplated for the present.

The election of Mr. Calvin to the office of president of the road will bring him back to the starting point in his railroad career, he having been a train brakeman and conductor running out of Omaha not so many years ago.
