**METHODISTS RAISE \$19,000 FOR A NEW CHURCH.**

The campaign started Thursday by the Methodists with the object of raising \$18,000 for the purpose of enlarging and remodeling their church building, closed Sunday with total subscriptions of nineteen thousand dollars, and this sum will be further increased by subscriptions from those who were not present at the Sunday meetings. Included in the \$19,000 is a gift of a \$2,000 pipe organ from Frank L. Mooney as a memorial to the late Mrs. Mooney. The cash funds will be ample to complete the accepted plans, and the congregation will have a structure commensurate with the growth of the organization and creditable to the congregation and city alike.

The enthusiasm for the new church was greatly augmented Friday evening when 300 church members and friends gathered at the Masonic hall, were served with a dinner by the ladies of the church and listened to a talk by Dr. Iliff of Denver, on the best method of raising the desired funds. Subscriptions were asked at the morning service and over \$14,000 pledged. At the evening service the sum was increased to \$19,000. The total amount pledged is evidence of the loyalty of the members to the church.

**JEFFERS NEW GENERAL MANAGER FOR THE U. P.**

An official circular issued from Union Pacific headquarters Saturday morning, signed by A. H. Mohler, president, announced the appointment of W. M. Jeffers, a former North Platte boy, general manager of the Union Pacific to succeed Charles Ware, resigned. The official duties of Mr. Jeffers became effective yesterday. Williston Mohler, who retired July 1st, it was done after he conferred with Mr. Calvin, who will succeed him as president. Mr. Jeffers had been general superintendent for several months and that office, while not abolished, will be vacant for an indefinite period. The promotion of Mr. Jeffers to be general manager of one of the greatest railroads in the world—and with which he began his service as messenger boy in this city—is particularly pleasing to The Tribune as well as to all his friends in North Platte. As a boy "Bill" Jeffers' advantages were no greater than surrounds the average boy, but he was industrious and ambitious; he had a desire to do his work well. As a messenger boy he was active, as a telegraph operator studious, as train dispatcher careful, as trainmaster he gave evidence of his executive ability. He was appointed assistant superintendent of the Wyoming division when that section of the Union Pacific was in a chaotic condition. A month after he took hold conditions improved and continued to improve. Corporations are not slow to recognize meritorious work, and after a few years as assistant, Mr. Jeffers was made superintendent of the Wyoming division. In the meantime that part of the road—the most difficult to handle on the system—had been brought up to the highest standard of maintenance and operation, the morale of the employees had been wonderfully improved, and the operating expenses reduced. "Bill" Jeffers had made a record that was known not only in headquarters in Omaha but with the directors in New York. Then came a call for Mr. Jeffers as general superintendent; now he is general manager.

"Watch Bill Jeffers Climb," remarked The Tribune more than a dozen years ago; and the inferred prediction has come true. Some day he will be president of the Union Pacific—then perhaps his cup of ambition will be full.
