WORK TO SOON START ON BUSINESS BUILDING

Plans and specifications for the new Belton building to be erected south of the I. O. O. F. hall are now in the hands of contractors and bids will be submitted in a short time. The building will be 22x126, two stories, with a 22x50 foot basement. Pressed brick will be used, the plate glass front on the ground floor will be particularly ornate, a heating plant will be installed and the building will be strictly modern in all respects.

Poulos Bros., of the North Platte Candy Kitchen, have taken a ten year lease of the entire building, occupying the ground floor and basement for their business. The second floor will have ten rooms, and these will be leased for offices. The front seventy feet of the ground floor will be used as the ice cream parlor, the floor being laid with tile and the lower part of the side walls lined with marble. In this room will be installed a 48-foot soda fountain and the furnishings will be in mahogany. In the rear will be a balcony of sufficient size to accommodate private parties and furnished as sumptuously as the main room. Underneath the balcony will be located a kitchen, the intention of Poulos Bros. being to make a specialty of serving lunches, not only during the day, but for theatre and other parties in the evening.

John Poulos spent a week in the east a short time ago and placed an order for the interior finishings and the furnishings, the total cost of which will fall but little short of ten thousand dollars.

An Ordinance No. 74

Providing for the construction of a Sewer Lateral District to be known as Sewer Lateral District "S" to consist of Blocks 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, and 44, of the original town of North Platte, Nebraska. Said sewer lateral beginning where the center line of the alley in block 33 extended east intersects the main sewer on Cottonwood street of said city running thence in a westerly direction on the center line of the alley in Blocks 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, and 44 of the original town of North Platte to where the center line of said alley intersects the west line of said block 44, there to terminate. To be constructed of ten inch sewer pipe with proper flush tanks, manholes, and proper appliances: Providing for an estimate of the cost thereof and for bids and making contracts for said sewer lateral, also providing for levying against the abutting lots along the line of said lateral sewer, a special assessment to pay the costs of constructing the same. Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 1. That a sewer lateral district to be known as Sewer Lateral District "S" be formed from Blocks 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, and 44, of the City of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 2. That a sewer lateral be constructed of ten inch sewer pipe at a proper depth on a level required by the present sewer system of said city beginning where the center line of the alley in Block 33 extended east intersects the main sewer on Cottonwood street in said city running thence in a westerly direction on the center line of the alley in Blocks 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, and 44 in the

original town of North Platte to where the center line of said alley intersects the west line of said block 44, there to terminate with proper flush tanks, manholes and appliances. Said district to be formed and said sewer to be constructed in all respects in conformity with the system of sewerage heretofore adopted by said city of North Platte, and in pursuance to a general ordinance regulating the construction of such sewers.

Section 3. That the engineer of said city at once prepare and file with the clerk thereof an estimate of the total costs of said proposed sewer lateral.

Section 4. That after said estimate is made and filed as herein provided the clerk of said city shall proceed at once to advertise in manner and form required by law for bids for the construction of said sewer lateral and appliances, reserving to said city the right to reject any and all bids therefor.

Section 5. If an approved bid be made for said work that a contract therefor be entered into by the mayor of said city attested by the clerk with the necessary provisions protecting the interests of said city upon the contractor furnishing a bond in sufficient amount for the faithful performance of said contract.

Section 6. To pay the costs of the construction of said sewer lateral, flush tanks, manholes and appliances a special assessment shall be levied according to law against the lots abutting on the line of said lateral.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval and publication according to law.

Passed and approved this 6th day of June, 1916.
