CONVENTION ENDS WITH LARGELY ATTENDED BANQUET

The ninth annual convention of the United Spanish War Veterans of Nebraska came to a close Tuesday evening with a banquet at the Lloyd opera house at which nearly two hundred were present.

Tuesday forenoon was devoted to a business session at which resolutions were passed favoring a return of the canteen service in the United States army, and a system of adequate preparedness for this country. A message was sent President Wilson endorsing his policy of preparedness, but asking for more radical measures.

The election of officers followed with this result: Department Commander, John G. Maher, of Lincoln; Senior Vice-Commander, A. W. Shilling of North Platte; Junior Vice-Commander, Henry Shrode, of Omaha; Department Inspector, Leonard Robinson, of North Platte; Department Chaplain, Harry Cline, of Omaha. Columbus was chosen as the place of holding the 1917 convention.

The afternoon was spent at the rifle range south of the state farm, the delegates being conveyed there in autos furnished by citizens.

The banquet was held at eight o'clock, a nice menu being served by Caterer Huffer. Plates had been laid for 150, but when evening came it was found that nearly 200 tickets had been sold and the caterer found it necessary to spread an additional table. During the service Stamp's orchestra and a male quartette composed of Messrs. Brown, McGrew, Armstrong and Mitchell furnished selections.

Judge Hoagland introduced the speakers who were Major Scharmann, of Chicago, W. V. Hoagland and Keith Neville of this city, Capt. Kline, of Omaha, and John G. Maher and Frank I. Ringer, of Lincoln.

The central features of all these talks were patriotism to country and adequate preparedness, and each was interesting and well delivered; in fact not in recent years have we heard better talks made in North Platte.
