Big Yield Wheat Promised.

E. S. Hogg, son-in-law of Henry Cordes of this city, who leased two sections of land three miles south of Hershey of E. A. Cary, and put in 410 acres of wheat last fall, is now harvesting it along with eighty acres on an adjoining section owned by Mr. Cordes. The wheat is being cut with a header, and while the work is not yet completed, there will be at least 125 stacks, each stack containing from fifteen to nineteen header box loads. It is expected, and the estimate is not considered too high, that each stack will thresh out 100 bushels, or a total of 12,500 bushels from 490 acres.
