**CAPTAIN HALLIGAN TELLS OF LIFE ON TEXAS BORDER.**

In a letter to The Tribune from Llano Grande, Texas, dated August 2d, Captain P. R. Halligan, of Company E, Fifth Regiment, writes as follows:

I had intended writing you soon after we left North Platte but we find our time pretty well taken up with instructions and routine work. We are getting better situated every day. Our new equipment will soon be here and we can then feel that we are regular soldiers.

The company has made wonderful progress since our arrival in Texas. We had regimental parade last night and you could not have distinguished our companies from the other companies. In fact I believe we now are in better shape than some of the companies that were organized at the time of the call.

Last Sunday night it was our turn to go on guard. Formal guard mounting was called off by reason of a heavy rain so guard was maintained informally. The night passed very quietly and without any excitement.

Last Friday our battalion took its first practice march of some ten miles. Every one came through in good shape, no one falling out during the entire march.

Last week General Parker, commander of the Brownsville district, talked to the officers of the Fourth and Fifth regiments. He gave us to understand that we were not brought to the border for training but for service and if it developed that we were not needed that we would be sent home at once.

Our instruction is in charge of a regular army officer who is detailed to each regiment. Besides four hours drill a day we have privates' school, non-commissioned officers' school and officers' school. The troops are already beginning to show the results of this system.

We notice that you have been having a very hot wave. It is hot in the sun here but this last week we have had a shower nearly every day. Also in the evening there is always a cool breeze blowing from the gulf.

It might be interesting to know that we pay forty-five cents a pound for butter, thirty-five cents for eggs and fifteen cents a quart for milk. On the other hand we purchased two dozen egg plants for the company for fifty-cents. This is a great vegetable country. The summer crop has been harvested and in a short time they will plant another crop for the winter market. Last Friday we saw, in the same field, cotton being picked and cotton growing, the latter to be picked in the fall.

**Circus and Parade.**

A parade and circus under the management of Miss Hungate, of the Chautauqua management, was given yesterday. Both the parade and the circus, in which children figured, were unique. The receipts were \$32.13, the expenses \$10.58 and the balance of \$21.55 was turned over by Miss Hungate to the city park board to assist in buying equipment for a children's play ground.
