GOVERNMENT SAFETY FIRST SPECIAL NEXT WEDNESDAY

The government safety first special, composed of ten exhibit cars and four cars for the accommodation of the men connected with the exhibits will reach here next Wednesday and remain from noon to nine o'clock in the evening.

This is a wonderfully interesting federal exhibit, and not an advertising scheme on the part of the Union Pacific. Each of the ten cars is given over to the exhibit of some particular line. One car, for instance, shows the appliances used at life saving stations, another gives in detail the safety first methods used by railroads, another shows methods of sanitation both for rural and town surroundings. A medical corps shows how the injured or wounded are treated, the construction of sub-marine vessels is shown, and there are exhibits of forestry, minerals and agriculture. The housefly is magnified many times in size and how it carries disease germs is demonstrated. Methods of reclaiming the arid west are shown, and what Uncle Sam is doing to protect forests is illustrated.

These exhibits are open to both men and women, and are of such nature as to interest every attendant.

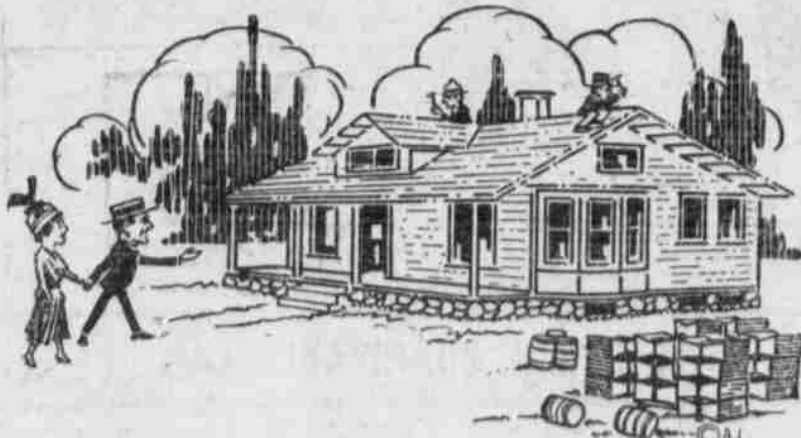
