County News.

The deposits in the two banks at Brady on August 10th, when statements were called, were \$305,748.21. Pretty good showing for a town of Brady's size.

Marshal Elliott, of Brady, arrested another auto speeder this week. He had to go to Farnam to make the arrest, and the fellow, knowing he was guilty, forked over \$25.

Jake Schafer, living near Brady, threshed 1,750 bushels of wheat from his fifty acre field, an average of thirty-five bushels per acre.

John Mapes is now threshing his crop of 400 acres of wheat grown south of town. So far, he tells us, the grain is running between 20 and 25 bushels per acre, and he is of the opinion that the average will be close to 25. 1,500 bushels are being delivered at \$1.30 per bushel.—Sutherland Free Lance.

The Sutherland Free Lance says: It is generally conceded that about every available acre in the wheat growing neighborhood will be devoted to winter wheat and rye another year, making a great increase in acres planted over this season.

While driving to North Platte yesterday morning in their auto Mrs. Frank England in passing another car drove rather close to the edge of a culvert across the road when a plank broke. The sudden lurch given by the car when the accident occurred precipitated one of the younger children through the wind shield hitting the little one's face and body quite severely. No other serious damage was reported.—Hershey Times.

Ferd Hollingsworth had the misfortune of having his leg broken just above the ankle last evening. He was feeding his mules, which were rather irritable, having had an encounter with a bumble bee nest during the day. They were crowding him when he struck one with a feed can. It pulled back and then lurched forward striking his foot and breaking the bone. The break was set immediately and Ferd is resting as easily as can be expected.—Hershey Times.

BIG DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST UNION PACIFIC

Three suits for damages, totaling \$27,000, were filed against the Union Pacific railroad Tuesday afternoon. Frederick Schiek, Henry Schiek and Martha Olive are the plaintiffs in the action. Three separate suits were filed. Frederick Schiek suing for \$7,000, Martha Olive for \$10,000 and Henry Schiek for \$10,000. The suits are based on injuries which resulted to the plaintiffs when an auto in which they were driving was struck by U. P. train. Engineer John Steuter was driving the engine and he was made party to the suit.

The accident in which the three plaintiffs were injured took place at Shelton on May 20. Frederick Schiek was driving his Metz car. He proceeded to cross the U. P. tracks just east of the Shelton depot. At the time a string of cars were standing about twenty feet from the crossing, according to the petitions filed. Schiek started across the track when without any warning the cars moved west and his machine was caught in the path of the train. The auto was struck at the front and all occupants of the car thrown out. The machine was also badly damaged.—Kearney Hub.

Municipal Tree Protection.

At Kearney a special committee has been appointed by the Commercial club to look after the preservation of trees.

This does not imply that the gentlemen will have to keep the trees pruned, set out new ones or water them, but they are to do a lot of missionary work along that line, encouraging others to look after their trees.

Some little time ago the Commercial club went on record as favoring a policy that would encourage tree planting and the looking after trees already planted. The report was made at a meeting that many trees died because of neglect and that others were threatened, either through lack of water or some curable tree disease. It was then that he club decided to have a little tree care taking class, the owners of trees throughout the entire city being pupils.

ORDINANCE NO. —

Being the general levy of taxes on the property of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for Revenue Purposes During the Fiscal Year, Commencing the second Monday in August, 1916.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of said City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section I. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, at the rate of five mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar water bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section II. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of two mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the purpose of paying the interest and principal of the Twenty-seven Thousand and Dollar sewer bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section III. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section IV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Twelve Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section V. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Sixteen Thousand and Dollar Paving Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of six and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for general revenue purposes of said city for the fiscal year beginning the Second Monday of August, 1916.

Section VII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the public library fund to be expended in the maintenance of the free public library of said city for said fiscal year.

Section VIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of one mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation to be expended for the maintenance of public parks in said city for said fiscal year.

Section IX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of four and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the pay for the lighting of streets and alleys of said city for said fiscal year.

Section X. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of three mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, to be expended in the maintenance and flushing of sewers.

Section XI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of six mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the fire department and the paying for fire protection for said fiscal year.

Section XII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of three mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, to be expended in payment of the Emergency Certificate of Indebtedness.

Section XIII. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication, according to law.
