Thomas Ryan left Sunday for Guernsey, where Mrs. Ryan and family are residing on a homestead.

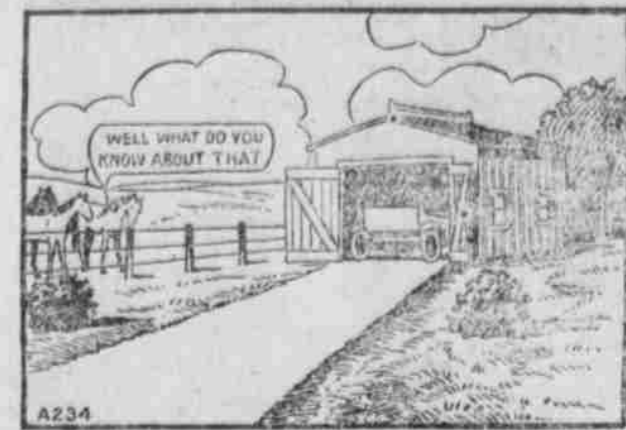
Joseph Wilson left the first of the week for Beatrice, York and other eastern points to spend two weeks.
