Miss Ella Swanson died at six-thirty o'clock yesterday morning after an illness of two weeks. Death was due to typhoid fever and appendicitis and her condition has been critical for several days. Miss Swanson came here from Gothenburg six months ago and entered the training school of nurses at the North Platte General hospital. She was an unusually apt pupil and was a general favorite among the surgeons and nursing staff with whom she worked. Her death, which came while she was in the early twenties, is deeply regretted by the friends she had made during her residence here. The remains will be taken to Gothenburg for burial.

## Herman Erb Dies Suddenly

Herman Erb an employe of the local U. P. machine shops died very suddenly Sunday afternoon at his rooms in the Huxoll home in the Fourth ward. Mr. Erb had been affected with kidney trouble for some time but his condition was not considered serious and Sunday morning he was in his usual health, spent an hour or more in several of the business houses, and at noon was reading on the porch. Becoming suddenly ill a physician was called, who stated that the end was near, and shortly after Mr. Erb died. He was about forty-five years of age and had been employed here for several years. Pending word from relatives no funeral arrangements have been made. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and the L. O. O. M. lodge.

## CHAMPION STECHER MAKES SHORT WORK OF DAVIS

Joe Stecher, champion wrestler of the world, made his initial bow before a North Platte audience at the ball park yesterday afternoon and exhibited his prowess on the mat by taking two falls out of Ed Davis, of Indianapolis. Both falls were by the scissor and half Nelson holds, the first occurring in seven minutes, the second in four and a half minutes. Davis put up a stiff fight in the first encounter, but in the second his efforts were purely on the defensive, and he was almost helpless in the hands of the powerful Stecher.

As the men were introduced by Referee J. T. Keefe, they were given a hearty applause. Stecher, as a Nebraska boy, receiving the most generous welcome. Davis is two pounds heavier than Stecher, but is an inch shorter. He really looked the stronger of the two, but Stecher had the muscle, strength and wind that counts. Davis failed to show up as strong as was expected, for he has an enviable mat record.

The two preliminaries were good, in fact to some they were more enjoyable than the main event for the reason that the contestants were more evenly matched and they lasted longer. M. Luttberg, of Omaha, took two falls out of Tom Hume of New York, the first in ten minutes, the second in fourteen, and one-half minutes. Hume was the quicker actor but his opponent had strength and weight in his favor.

The bout between Ray Trabert and "Dutch" Manover of Alliance, was full of vinegar and the men worked faithfully and well for thirty minutes without securing a fall.

The crowd attending was a disappointment to the promoter of the exhibition, Carl Kramer, of Fremont, and to the local committee who assisted in the arrangements. The attendance of out-of-town people was fairly good, but the number of North Platte residents was small.
