COLORED SECTION HAND KILLS FELLOW WORKMAN.

Gus Hunter, colored, was arrested at Chappell early Sunday morning by Special Agents North and Wayman of the Union Pacific secret service on the charge of having killed John Thomas, also colored, in a bunk house at Sunol at 8:45 Saturday evening. Hunter was placed in jail at Chappell and will have a preliminary hearing this week. It is understood that the two men became involved in a quarrel over a crap game, and the shooting and death followed.

This is the second instance where colored men employed as trackmen on the Union Pacific have killed fellow laborers, the other killing having occurred at Birdwood several months ago.
