"High authority asserts that probably one-fourth of all the educated people in America suffer from various kinds of disturbances more or less due to eyestrain." Strange though it may seem, eyestrain is capable of disturbing our whole organism, because of the reflex relation between eyes and the vital parts of the human machine. Constant exhaustion and strain of these vital centers will frequently cause disturbances of the most extensive character. This follows because the strain of civilization rests heavier upon the eyes than upon any other organ. School life is responsible for deformities of the eye, and approximately, one-third of all the children in the upper grades of the elementary schools have eyes that rather seriously need correction.


