Wets to Have Inning.

A public meeting under the auspices of the Nebraska Prosperity League will be held at the court house at eight o'clock this evening. The speaker will be Vernon J. Rose, of Kansas City, Kan., and his subject will be "Prohibition in Action." He will endeavor, says the bill distributed, to show the fallacy of prohibition concerning insanity, crime and morality in Kansas as given by the official records of Kansas, and will tell his audience just how prohibition in Kansas works.

Examination for Rural Carrier.

The civil service commission announces that an examination for motor rural carrier will be held at North Platte October 28th to fill the position of carrier, and vacancies that may occur, later. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$1,500 to \$1,800. The appointee will be required to furnish and maintain a modern motor vehicle of not less than 800 pounds carrying capacity and a cubic capacity of not less than eighty feet.

No Successor Elected.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce held a meeting last evening and with reluctance accepted the resignation of Secretary Fisher, who goes to Boise, Idaho. It was the sense of the board that Mr. Fisher be presented with some remembrance of his good work, and it will be selected by a committee. A strong letter of commendation to be presented to the Boise Commercial Club will be prepared.

One application as a successor to Mr. Fisher was received, but not accepted. It is probable that the selection of a successor will not be made until next spring. Miss Dorothy Hinman, in the meantime, to be retained to do the clerical work, and members of the directory will be detailed to assist her. It is believed that in this way the work can be handled very nicely during the winter months.

WARREN SOULES CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED RAPE

Warren Soules, of Brady, was arraigned in the county court yesterday on the charge of attempted rape on Mrs. Flora DeLong last Friday afternoon at her home near Brady. The woman's husband filed the complaint Tuesday but Soules was not located until yesterday, when he was brought to jail.

The story told by DeLong is that Soules, while working near the DeLong farm went to the house and asked for a grain sack. Noting the absence of the husband, it is alleged that Soules attacked Mrs. DeLong with a view of raping her. The woman, however, succeeded in fighting him off and he finally left.

Soules was out on parole from state prison, having completed serving the minimum of an indeterminate sentence given him on the charge of cattle stealing.

At the arraignment yesterday the defendant pleaded not guilty.
