**Beaumont Greater Than Fletcher.**

Francis Beaumont is most renowned for his share in writing Beaumont and Fletcher's plays, a partnership probably unequalled in the history of literature and very seldom rivaled. The Alsatian novelists, who ultimately quarreled, Erckmann and Chatrian, and the English novelists Besant and Rice are somewhat parallel, although Sir Walter Besant went on, writing successfully for years after the death of his colleague. In the Elizabethan partnership it was otherwise. Fletcher, though the elder man, outlived his friend for more than nine years and proved himself the lesser poet. Beaumont was laid to rest in the poets' corner of Westminster abbey, which he has sung in such noble verse.—London Globe.

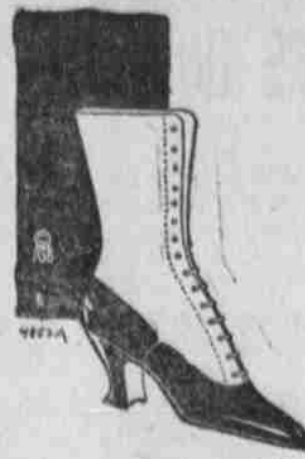
**Berlioz.**
