### Taking a Straw Vote.

A ballot box has been placed at the Vienna Cafe and a straw vote is in progress on the candidates for the presidency and for governor. 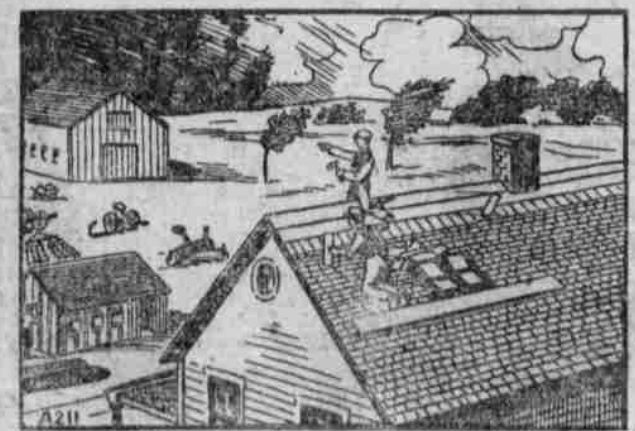

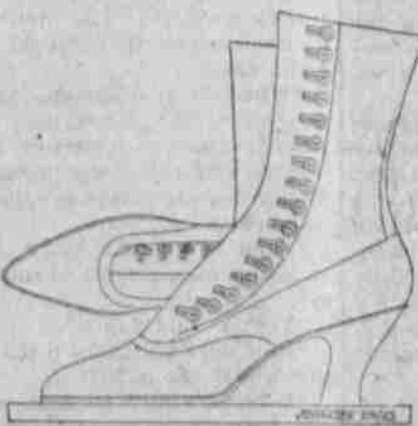
