### ROOSEVELT PASSES THROUGH: URGES GREATER AMERICANISM

Theodore Roosevelt, for seven and one-half years president of the United States made a brief talk from the platform of the rear car on train No. 14 Wednesday evening to a crowd of several hundred people who had assembled at the depot. Mr. Roosevelt was enroute east from Denver, where he made three addresses the day before.

In his brief address he said here in the west—and thirty-five years ago he himself was of the west—is found that class of genuine Americanism that fought the battles of the revolution and the civil war, and he pleaded that that spirit of nationalism be not dimmed but rather strengthened for the defense of the country and American standing abroad. Under the present administration this country has been "too proud to fight," and as a result 300 good Americans have lost their lives in Mexico and on the Mexican border; 300 other Americans lost their lives on the Lusitania because foreign nations thought, by the evidence given, that we were too proud to fight. If this country is "too proud to fight, it is not too proud to be kicked," said Mr. Roosevelt. He had started in to urge that babies be raised with the true American spirit, when the train began moving, and amid the waving of hands and cheering, he burst out, "Good Lord, I hate to leave."

### MRS. MARY F. MOONEY PASSES AWAY YESTERDAY

Mrs. Mary F. Mooney, who had been critically ill for several weeks, passed away yesterday forenoon at ten o'clock at her home on west Second street. Mrs. Mooney became unconscious Wednesday evening and remained so until the spirit took its flight. Funeral services will be held from the residence at 502 west Third street at 2:30 Saturday afternoon, conducted by Rev. B. F. Cram.

Mary F. Ogle Mooney was born at Bluffton, Ind., May 19th, 1843, the eldest of a large family, and later lived at Minonk, Ill. November 15th, 1866, she was married to David Mooney who died March 1st, 1912, in this city. To this union were born five sons and one daughter, two of the sons dying at an early age. Those surviving are Brenton Mooney and George A. Mooney, of St. Louis, and Frank L. Mooney and Miss Grace Mooney of this city. Other relatives are a grandson Frank Alfred Mooney, of this city, a sister Mrs. H. A. Miller of Minonk, Ill., who had been spending the past six weeks here, and four brothers who reside at different points in Illinois.

In the spring of 1878 Mr. and Mrs. Mooney removed to Furnas county, Nebr., locating near Beaver City. Here for five years they experienced all the hardships and experiences of the early pioneers. In 1884 they moved to Lexington, where they resided for twenty-five years and removed to this city six years ago.

Mrs. Mooney united with the Methodist church when fourteen years of age, and ever remained a consistent member, doing much in church and missionary work. She was a charter and active member of the Woman's Relief Corps and the W. C. T. U. Mrs. Mooney made many friends and this friendship held firmly, not only in North Platte but in Lexington and other places where she resided. With a true christian spirit she patiently bore many long sieges of sickness, and especially during the past month when she was so critically ill from the effects of a growth which closed her throat.

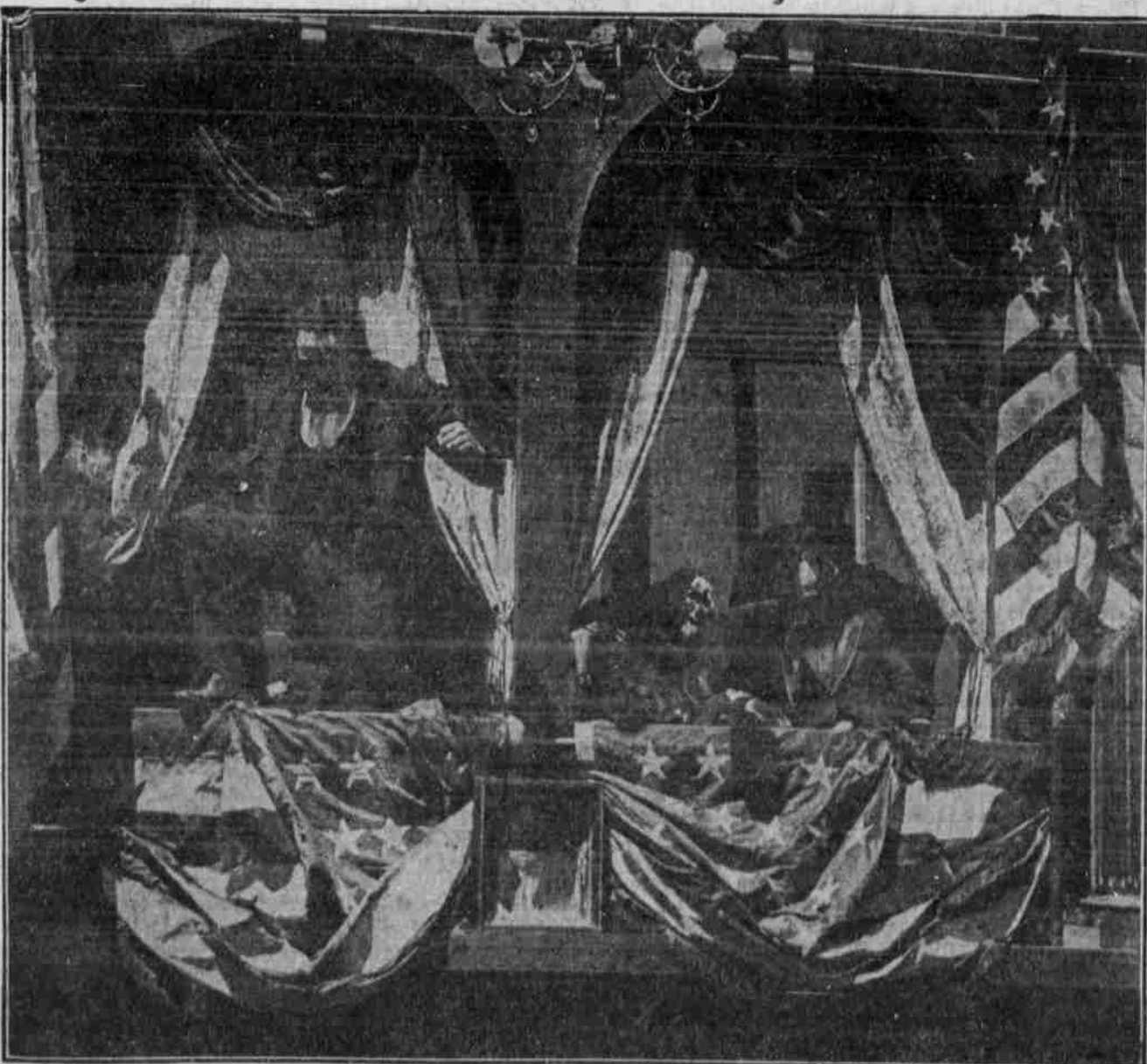
