GROUND BROKEN FOR NEW UNION PACIFIC DEPOT

Work on the new \$125,000 depot which the Union Pacific will build in North Platte started Saturday, when the foundation course was staked out and several men began working on the excavation. A sidetrack has also been laid on the north side of the site which will be used to haul off the dirt from the trenches and for the handy unloading of material.

The foundation walls will be about eight feet wide, and under the main portion of the building will go down to a depth of seventeen feet.

The main part of the building will stand directly in front of Pine street, this section will be two stories, the waiting rooms will have a court and surrounding the court will be the offices for the local officials. The east and west wings will be one story, the west to be used as dining and lunch rooms, the east wing for express and baggage rooms. The entire length of the building is 230 feet.

Pressed brick with stone trimmings will form the exterior material, and throughout the building will be as nearly fire proof as it is possible to build. It is figured that it will require at least a year to complete the building.

The only present drawback is the inability to get men for work on the excavation, but it is expected that a big force of laborers will be shipped in within a few days.

More Bootleggers Arrested.

James Erskine and Myrtle McCellan were arrested Saturday evening for bootlegging. The liquor was found in rooms on the second floor of the McDonald building on Locust street. Nineteen bottles were found concealed in the floor which was covered with rugs. Erskine was kept until the trial yesterday afternoon and Miss McCellan was out on fifty dollar bonds.

Both were arraigned before Judge French yesterday afternoon and pleaded not guilty. Hearing was set for next Friday. They were bound over in the sum of \$400 each and the woman presenting two \$400 certified checks, they were given their liberty.
