Governor Keith Neville

The Tribune most heartily congratulates Keith Neville, of this city, upon his election as governor of Nebraska, and with the same sincerity congratulates the people of the state that he is to be their chief executive.

Mr. Neville made a clean, honorable campaign, vigorous and effective. He impressed the people with his straightforwardness, his sincerity and his apparent ability. The longer he remained in the campaign the greater became his popularity, and though perhaps handicapped by an issue that had no place in politics, he won out handsomely.

Eight-Hour Law Hailed Into Court.

The Union Pacific Railroad company filed suit in the federal court at Omaha Wednesday to test the constitutionality of the so-called "eight-hour law," recently passed by congress, and known as the Adamson act.

Thomas S. Allen, United States district attorney, and four Union Pacific trainmen representing the different railroad brotherhoods are made parties defendant. The bill of complaint alleges that the law is unconstitutional because it is not a proper regulation of interstate commerce; because it violates the guarantees of the fifth amendment to the federal constitution, and because it is unworkable as applied to existing conditions under which the trainmen are operating. The bill of complaint is a printed document of considerable size and contains copies of all the schedules under which the trainmen work.

It is said that this is the first suit filed in the United States to test the Adamson act.

Nebraska Democrat

Returns from the state have been slow in coming in, but enough have been received to indicate that Wilson will carry Nebraska by 18,000 or 20,000. Hitchcock will be elected United States senator by 8,000 or 9,000 and Neville governor by 6,000 to 8,000. The entire state democratic ticket with the possible exception of state superintendent has been elected, and it is indicated that the legislature will be democratic.

Mrs. Cohn was a devoted wife and mother, ever thoughtful for the welfare of her children and her blind husband. She was also an invalid for many years, walking on crutches from the effects of rheumatism. She was a pioneer of Lincoln county and lived here continually until the time of her death, which occurred Wednesday, October 18th, at 12:55 a. m., after an illness of five months, being a patient sufferer during this time.

Funeral services were held at the church at Plainview cemetery Sunday, October 22, conducted by Rev. Duholm, of Maxwell, and the remains laid to rest beside her son Will who departed this life May 21, 1907, being killed by lightning.
