**NORTH PLATTE CONTENDER FOR STATE CHAMPIONSHIP**

Karl Lee, a sport writer in the Omaha Sunday Bee says:

An upset in the eleventh hour of the state high school football campaign has placed North Platte in a position to contend for leadership. By defeating Lexington by a score of 37 to 7 the western team becomes one of the powerful teams of the state. Coach Baskin has improved his eleven from a weak combination into one of the dangerous competitors for the title.

The 13 to 12 score against the Curtis Aggies and a corresponding small victory over Cosad, by a score of 13 to 0, indicated that Baskin did not have a strong team. Late developments, however, have shown a turning point in the prospects and there is a fair possibility that this team will defeat Lincoln when they meet November 25. If such occurs North Platte will either be the state champions or on a par with Central High for first honors. The team boasts of two stars of all-state caliber in Baker at tackle and Christ at half back.

With the Central-Lincoln game gone, this North Platte-Lincoln game is the only big one of the conference for the rest of the season. The game will be played at Lincoln.
