### PERJURY COMPLAINT FILED AGAINST JESSIE PARKHURST

Following the conviction of Jim Erskine and Myrtle McClellan on the charge of selling a quart of whiskey to John Little, County Attorney Gibbs filed a complaint against Jessie Parkhurst Wednesday charging her with perjury. The latter was a witness in the case, and in the complaint filed against her it is charged that she testified that neither Erskine nor the McClellan woman sold Little the whiskey, but that it was sold to him by a man who occupied one of the rooms at Madison rooming house; that the man came out of his room, handed Little a quart bottle of whiskey; that Little placed the bottle in his overcoat pocket and without a word passing between the two, Little handed the stranger two dollars. The stranger then returned to his room.

In the trial of the case Little testified that he went to the rooming house, engaged a room and asked Erskine if he knew where, he, Little, could get some whiskey. Erskine replied that he thought he did, and went out. In about five minutes the McClellan woman returned with a quart bottle, for which he paid her two dollars. He placed the bottle in his overcoat pocket, whereupon the McClellan woman suggested that he get smaller bottles in order to more easily conceal it. Little went down on the street and secured smaller bottles as suggested.

This wide discrepancy in the testimony of the two witnesses convinced County Attorney Gibbs that one or the other had committed perjury with strong evidence that Jessie Parkhurst was the guilty one. The filing of the complaint followed.

Sentence has not been pronounced.
