## Texas Evangelist Begins Services

Rev. Earp, of Texas, who comes here to hold revival services at the Baptist church, opened his campaign Sunday with three addresses, and very favorably impressed his large audiences. Rev. Earp is a very forceful speaker, void of sensationalism, and so plainly presents his pleas for better living as to deeply impress his hearers. In stature he is big, his presence is commanding, his voice strong and well rounded, and his command of language excellent, and all these tend to center the interest of his hearers and make more fruitful his sermons.

Rev. Earp will speak each evening, and probably at some special services, until December 20th when he will return to Texas to spend Christmas with his family. Early in the new year he will return to Nebraska to hold services at several points.
