

**ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED FOR NEVILLE RECEPTION TONIGHT**

All arrangements for the big public reception to Governor-elect Keith Neville have been completed, and it is believed the affair will prove very creditably and successful.

The parade, which will be a feature of the evening will start at seven o'clock sharp, and will include the Yeoman drill team, the high school cadets, United Spanish War veterans, the drum corps of the latter organization, the municipal band, men and boys on foot and autos. It is requested that the owner of every car be in line. Thousands of Roman candles have been provided, and will be furnished to those taking part in the parade and by them fired. Huge bonfires will be used, cannons fired, and for a time the town will be a lurid blaze.

The exercises at the Lloyd will begin at the close of the parade.

Music will be furnished by the band and a male quartette, and short addresses made by W. H. Thompson, of Grand Island, Wm. Ritchie, of Bridgeport, E. B. McDermott of Kearney, W. Mitchell, of Alliance, and the governor-elect. Mayor Evans will preside as chairman and introduce the speakers.

Punch will served in the hall during the evening.
