RAILROADS AND BROTHERHOODS MAY SETTLE DIFFERENCES.

W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen publicly announced at Evansville, Ind., Friday for the first time that negotiations are under way between the leaders of the brotherhoods and those higher up in the chambers of the operating departments of the railroads, looking to a settlement of their entire controversy out of court before January 1; when the Adamson law is scheduled to go into effect. He said the settlement was in a crude state as yet. Mr. Lee made the statement in the course of an address before the central states conference on water and rail transportation which closed its sessions here tonight.

"I know I am not betraying confidences," he said, "when I say some of the very best brains high up in the chambers of the operating departments of the railroads favored something satisfactory to both sides and they have discussed it with us. I left them only Wednesday night in New York and will be back there very soon. We hope to work it out. We know that if we don't work it out for ourselves, the employees and the employers, somebody is going to work it for us and it will not be acceptable to either side."

Mr. Lee said it was the hope of the brotherhoods to effect a settlement outside and independently of the provision of the Adamson law. He intimated that the railroad leaders also shared this hope.

Government Recognizes Cody.

Because William F. Cody elected to become a showman, rather than to fold his military dignity about him and go into retirement with the close of the American Indian campaigns, he has not generally been justly regarded with relation to the service in which he distinguished himself. He was one of the ablest and bravest scouts of the frontier period in the United States, and the War Department has now decided that he is entitled to a place on the army and navy medal of honor roll, which is maintained by the commissioner of pensions under the provisions of the act of April, 1916. The present generation should be informed that "Buffalo Bill" was famous before "Wild West" shows were thought of.

Jury Fails to Agree.

The jury in the case of Mrs. Nettie Karkker against Dr. Henry Farrell, of Wallace, failed to reach a verdict after being out twenty-seven hours. The case went to the jury Friday afternoon and after spending the night and all day in trying to reach an agreement concluded to disagree. In this case the plaintiff sued the defendant for \$5,000 damages for unskilled treatment at child birth and from which it is alleged ill health has followed.

In Friday's issue it was stated that Dr. Rundstrom was the defendant, which was an error, as that physician, at the request of the plaintiff's husband, was called to assist Dr. Farrell.

Granted a Divorce.

Emma A. Anderson was granted a divorce from William O. Anderson in the district court Saturday morning. They were married in this county August 10th, 1896. The plaintiff alleges that she had been subject to extreme cruelty and asked for three thousand dollars alimony, to be paid annually in five hundred dollar checks with interest. The custody of the children, Clarence age eighteen, Hugh age sixteen, Howard age thirteen and Bert age ten, was given to the plaintiff and the defendant will be allowed to visit them at stated times.

Mrs. Howe Sells Interest.

The interest of Mrs. Sarah A. Howe, of York, in the Howe & Maloney store of this city has been taken over by Mr. Maloney and the firm will be known as the W. R. Maloney Co. Complete Grade in Utah.

Kilpatrick Bros. of Beatrice, have finished grading on an eighteen mile line for the Union Pacific between Emery and Wehatchee, Utah. The line cannot be opened for traffic before late next summer as three difficult tunnels remain to be finished. For a time 3,000 men were employed on this work.
