PRACTICAL HEALTH HINT.

Hot Applications For Pain. Pain and a tight feeling in the A chest are greatly relieved by an 4 application of turpentine-spirits of turpentine-a few drops sprinkled on a piece of hot flanuel which has been wrung out of hot water. It is difficult, however, to wring flamel out of boiling water without scalding the fingers. The best plan, therefore, is to hold the finnel by the corner, drain for an instant, then put it in a towel lengthwise. Take each end of the towel in the hands and twist in opposite directions. This will wring the flannel almost dry, yet leave it very warm. The turpentine application is also an excellent remedy for pain in the abdomen, especially, the colicky kind of pain caused by catching cold.
