Wheat Sells High.

Eleven thousand bushels of wheat was marketed at the Leopold & Pennington elevator last week, evidence that the farmers are still holding a considerable portion of their crop. The highest price paid during the week was on Friday when the bulk sold at \$1.72 1/2. Instances are known where farmers living in the section tributary to North Platte are holding what wheat they have left for a two dollar market. This, of course, is somewhat of a gambling proposition. If the present talk of peace between the warring nations becomes stronger with the possibility of reaching a successful climax, the price of wheat will no doubt tumble and tumble rapidly; but if war continues unabated, two dollar wheat is a possibility.

Poultry Association Elects Officers.
At the close of the poultry show last Friday, the association held an election of officers and re-elected M. C. Rogers president for two year term, F. W. Hansen vice president; J. A. McDonald re-elected secretary and J. H. Van Cleave re-elected treasurer.

The association will send a big delegation to the state poultry show which will be held at Kearney next week and will make a strong bid to secure the state show for North Platte next year.

Ten pens of chickens will be shipped from North Platte to the Kearney show.

Cards received in town this morning announce the marriage of Miss Mabel Patterson, a former North Platte girl, to James Stavert Elliott, the ceremony occurring at Meeteetse, Wyo., Sunday, December 24th, where the bride had been teaching school. It was intended that the wedding should be held at a later date, but Mr. Elliott had a business call to Canada and it was then concluded to be married and make the Canadian trip as bride and groom.

Sells Farm for \$16,000.

JIM AND MYRTLE EACH DRAW A \$1,000 FINE

Turner Gets \$150 Fine and John Shaffer 30 Days—All Defendants to Pay Costs.

John Shaffer, Chas. Turner, Myrtle McClellan and Jim Erskine, convicted in the district court of the illegal sale of liquor, were summoned before Judge Grimes Saturday forenoon and given their sentences.

Shaffer, who plead guilty, drew thirty days jail sentence, and assessed the court costs.

Turner was fined \$150 and to pay costs amounting to \$54.80.

Myrtle McClellan and Jim Erskine, who were convicted on four counts, were sentenced to pay a fine of one thousand dollars each and the court costs, the latter amounting to \$328.20.

The judge gave Turner a rather emphatic reprimand by reason of information reaching the judge that Turner had been dealing in liquor since his trial. He warned him to desist. Sentence as it related to Myrtle McClellan was suspended on part of the counts, and by making a cash payment of \$500 fine and the costs amounting to \$342.40, a total of \$842.40 she was released from custody Saturday evening, after spending the afternoon in jail. Erskine is in jail and will probably remain there and lay out the \$1,000 fine. This will require 333 days. But while Jim is there he will not be selling booze and getting into trouble.

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Mrs. Spencer, Regent of the Local Tells of the Aims and Objects of this Patriotic Association.

So many inquiries are made concerning the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution that a short sketch of the organization may be of interest.

The national Society D. A. R. was organized by eighteen women October 11, 1890, at Washington, D. C., following the inspiration of a newspaper article in the Washington Post by Mrs. Mary Smith Lockwood, (who by way, is an aunt of Gov.-elect Neville). Mrs. Lockwood is called the "Pen Founder" of the society. Mrs. Benjamin Harrison was first President General, followed by Mrs. Adlai Stevenson, Mrs. Jno. W. Foster, Mrs. Dan'l Manning, Mrs. Donald McLean, Mrs. Chas. Fairbanks, Mrs. Matthew T. Scott, and Mrs. Wm. Cumming Story.

The Society was incorporated under the laws of congress and a charter granted under which the annual report is made to congress each year and printed as a senate document.

The object of the Society is to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who achieved American independence, by acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by encouragement of historical research, preservation of documents and relics; and the record of individual service of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; to foster true patriotism and love of country. The headquarters of the society are at Memorial Continental Hall, Washington, D. C., a beautiful white marble building erected at a cost of \$500,000. Here the annual meetings called the Continental Congress are held during the week of the 18th of April to which one or more daughters from each chapter in the Society is a delegate.

Any woman who is 18 years of age is eligible to membership provided she is descended from a man or woman who rendered material aid to the cause of American independence, provided, also, she is acceptable to the National Society and to the local chapter. This requires the name, date of birth, marriage, and death of parents, grand-parents, great grand-parents—a record of his service and proof of such record. Usually three, four or five generations are required, although we have many "Real Daughters"—those whose father served in the Revolutionary war, and are pensioned by the Society. Nebraska has one "Real Daughter," a Mrs. Tewksbury, who lives at Fairbury. Every assistance is given by local and national officers free of charge to secure this data.

Contrary to the prevailing opinion the expense of D. A. R. membership is nominal, \$1 for initiation, \$2.25 for local, state and national dues—in other words \$3.25 to join and \$2.25 per year after becoming a member. This entitles the member to the parchment certificate of membership and the D. A. R. monthly magazine which is a delight to every reader.

The work of the chapter is entirely within its own control. We hope for North Platte the establishment of a genealogical department in our public library, and the collecting of the early history of North Platte.

The chief work in the state has been the marking of the old trails, the restoration and preservation of historic spots and of public documents; the writing of local histories; patriotic education and honor and respect for our flag. The society has published the first volume of "Personal Reminiscences of the Early Pioneer," which gives in their own language the experiences and observations of those who "blazed the trail" for us all. North Platte and many of its early settlers are prominently mentioned in this book, one chapter of late history being furnished by the late Major Walker. A copy of this book may be seen at Rincker's Drug Store. It is planned to issue another volume as soon as this edition is disposed of and every one is urged to assist in this book by accumulating data. One by one these old people are passing away and it is our duty to preserve the records of early days that they alone can give. Our historian, Mrs. Anna Church, has charge of this important work and will gladly compile all records.

While the social prestige of the L. A. R. is second to none, numbering among its leaders the wives of presidents, senators, in fact, Official Washington, and the leading women throughout the union in its 126,000 membership, yet the purpose of the society is not society, nor is it in any sense ancestry worship. Through the influence, enthusiasm and accomplishments of the Daughters of the American Revolution there has resulted an intense interest in history and historical research in the United States that will result not only in a proper appreciation and respect for all who have helped make our country great,

but will also result in higher standard of citizenship and an exalted patriotism.
