The object of the Society is to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who achieved American independence, by acquisition and protec tion of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by encouragement of historical research, preservation o documents and relics and the record of individual service of the Revoludonary soldiers and patriots; to fos ter true patriotism and love of counry. The headquarters of the society ash at Memorial Continental Hall, Washington, D. C., a beautiful white marble building erected at a cost of \$500,000. Here the annual meetings called the Continental Congress are held during the week of the 18th of April; to which one or more daughters from each chapter in the Society is a delegate.
