### THE END OF THE TRAIL.

"Colonel Cody passed away at 12:05 today."

That was the sentence flashed over the wire from Denver to North Platte shortly after noon Wednesday, and the hearts of the people of North Platte were saddened. Though our people knew that their old friend and former neighbor had for some time been fighting approaching death, there was yet a hope that he who had made so many miraculous escapes on the western plains might again elude his pursuer. Though he fought heroically, he lost, but in losing he met the enemy with a smile and accepted defeat with supreme resignation. His seventy-one years of life in activity and accomplishment measured up to the life of the ordinary man of even his advanced years—for Colonel Cody as a boy, as a young man, in mature years and in his sunset, was ever active, tireless, indefatigable; a doer of things, a man who secured results.

Colonel Cody's life in North Platte, his character and his deeds will be remembered as long as North Platte exists. His former companions, associates and friends may pass on, but their children and the children of their children, and those of each succeeding generation will cherish the memory of Colonel William Frederick Cody, the redoubtable Buffalo Bill the scout, whose name and figure have been known in practically every civilized nation on earth.

The end came to the old scout when surrounded by his wife, his daughter, his sisters and other relatives, and with them until almost to the last he conversed; told them of his last desires, and then fell into a sleep that knew no earthly waking.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon and, in accordance with the Colonel's wish, will be in charge of the Denver lodge of Elks. All the societies to which he belonged, however, are to have a part. The body will lie in state in the state capitol from eight o'clock until noon, and then funeral troops will escort the body from the capitol to the Elks' home where the services will be held. The body will be placed in a receiving vault in a Denver cemetery but the burial will not take place until Decoration Day, when it is planned to remove it elsewhere. It has been suggested that the interment be at the Ft. McPherson national cemetery along side a number who served with the old scout in the Indian campaigns.

Quite a few North Platte people plan on attending the funeral.
