700 ASK COUNCIL TO ENFORCE GAMBLING LAW

MONSTER PETITION SIGNED BY MEN AND WOMEN PRESENTED TO CITY FATHERS

Councilmen Will Investigate Conditions in Pool Halls and Cigar Stores and Determine if Law is Being Violated.

"We, the undersigned men and women of North Platte, Neb., respectfully request that the law regarding gambling be enforced in our city." This petition signed by seven hundred, was presented to the city council at the meeting Tuesday evening.

Van Cleave moved that the petition be accepted and the chief of police be instructed to strictly enforce the law against gambling, especially in cigar stores and pool halls. The motion was seconded by Knox and upon roll call Van Cleave and Knox voted for, Bell and Simon against and Porter and Von Goetz declined to vote, stating that they wanted time to investigate conditions before they went on record.

Councilman Stone and Cochran were not present. Von Goetz then made a motion that the petition be held pending a thorough investigation, presuming by members of the council, and this motion passed unanimously.

Van Cleave insisted that playing cards in cigar stores or elsewhere where the losers pay in checks redeemable in merchandise was a violation of the state law, and Knox coincided in this view. Bell thought the crusade against gambling should be directed to the poker and crap games, which are the most harmful, and which are reported to be carried on in private rooms. Mayor Evans said that if it was the wish of the council to have the card games in the cigar stores discontinued, the police would be instructed to close them up the following morning.

Some of the councilmen think that if the cigar store games are broken up it will drive certain men, who look up on card games as their recreation, into playing poker in private rooms that are practically inaccessible to the police, thereby creating a greater evil. This to some extent may be true, galling conditions will do no harm; in fact it is a good move, for it will at least result in removing from the game the more objectionable features.

The somewhat notorious Myrtle McClellan, convicted of illegal sale of liquor, and who was to have a hearing in the county court today on the charge of maintaining an immoral house, left the city last night. North Platte Takes Prizes. At the state poultry show held at Kearney this week, North Platte gathered in a number of prizes. With 2100 birds on exhibition J. A. McDonald took first prize on Light Brahmans, Lee Simon took three first prizes, one second, one third and one fourth on Blue Orpingtons and E. W. Hansen took fourth prize on White Orpingtons. North Platte made a bid for the state show in 1918. Holdrego is the competing point. The result will not be known until August.

Admiral Dewey Dies. Admiral Dewey, the nation's Spanish war hero and by priority of grade the ranking naval officer of the world, died at his home in Washington Tuesday night, in his eightieth year. He had not been conscious since Monday, when he lapsed into coma, still believing that in a few days he would be back at his desk in the navy department.

A general breakdown accompanied by arterio sclerosis, incident to old age, was the cause of death. The disease had been gradually spreading its hold upon the powerful body for a year and a half, but the admiral, proud of his physical vigor, had fought it off, and stoically kept its existence a secret even from his most intimate friends. Wednesday last week he was at his office, apparently hale and hearty. The next day he collapsed as he was preparing to leave the house, and that was the beginning of the end.
