DRY FORCES AGREE ON FORM OF BILL

"It is farthest from my mind to make prohibition a farce," said Governor Keith Neville to the legislative dry committee. "I want it enforced."

The house and senate committees, meeting jointly behind closed doors Thursday afternoon, heard the governor so express himself. The joint committee immediately took action looking to just such a prohibitory statute as Governor Neville recommended in his inaugural address.

The committee adopted a resolution favoring a bill that will permit people to receive a "limited amount" of intoxicating liquors from outside the state, and in favor of the enforcement of a prohibitory law by a state commission. It was further resolved that a sub-committee of five draft a bill to be presented to the joint committee for consideration.

This action of the joint dry committee clears the decks for action in the direction of prohibition. It indicates that the specially chosen members of both houses are in favor of a prohibitory law that is not "bone dry." This is in accord with Governor Neville's message. It indicates that the joint committee is in favor of a commission to enforce prohibition, the machinery advocated by the governor in his message to the legislature. It is taken for granted that this machinery means the governor himself is to be responsible for enforcement. The governor in his message called it a "public welfare department," to be composed of a deputy and as many assistants as necessary, the salaries to be large enough to be attractive to able men, the appointments to be made by the governor.

Pedestrian Has Right of Street

In Milwaukee last week Circuit Judge Fritz ruled that a pedestrian has right-of-way over an automobile in crossing a street. This ruling was given in a case where a pedestrian had been injured by an automobile when crossing the street and the judge awarded the plaintiff \$5,000 damages, the full amount asked.

The court ruled that a pedestrian is not guilty of negligence if, after having taken an observation when about to enter a roadway to ascertain if an automobile were coming and failing to see any, he omitted to look again.

Will Re-organize K. P. Lodge.

Through the efforts of Geo. E. French old Mazepa lodge, Knights of Pythias, of this city, will be re-organized. There are about thirty of the old members who will apply for reinstatement, and in addition an equal number of new applicants have been secured.

At one time Mazepa lodge was the strongest fraternal organizations in the city, and included in its membership practically all our best orators who put on the ritualistic work in a perfect manner.

Kids Can't Drive.

Notice has been sent out by the state officials that the law prohibiting children under the age of sixteen years from driving automobiles will be rigidly enforced. The state law permits boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 19 to drive automobiles when accompanied by their parents, guardian or some adult person. Children under the age of 16 are not permitted to drive a car under any conditions.

Family Saved by a Dream

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 28.—Aroused from a nightmare in which she dreamed someone was attempting to harm one of her brothers, Miss Ruth Rickard, 2482 Ogden street, felt a terrible pair in her head, then realized the house was filled with gas, and after falling to the floor succeeding in arousing her mother and brothers and saved their lives. Cries of the fainting girl woke the mother.

Three Autoists Killed.

Three persons were killed early yesterday morning when Rock Island train No. 8 struck an auto near Thirty-second and South streets, Lincoln. The dead: E. A. Laxon, garage owner, Havelock; Mrs. E. A. Laxon, about fifty years old; unidentified man, about twenty years old. The first two were killed instantly; the third died about twenty minutes after he had been removed to a hospital.

STATE FARM HOGS WIN PRIZES AT DENVER

In the National Western Stock Show held at Denver the Experimental Substation won Reserve Champion, one first and one second prize, on car-lots of hogs. On individual Duro-Jersey barrows the Substation won Reserve Champion, one first, three second and one third ribbon. The cash premiums totaled \$90. One of these car-lots of hogs sold in the ring at \$13.50 per 100 pounds and the other car-lot at \$12.50. The returns from the sale of the individual barrows has not been received. The net profit from showing these hogs is over \$200.

PEOPLE AND EVENTS.

The "Jeep year girl of Toledo," Miss Florence Stevens, didn't land the man, but she landed a judgment of \$8,000 against Edgar J. Leuchs for damages to her heart. Some 500 letters of fluff staff turned in by Leuchs convinced the jury that Florence won a financial renovator.

Aurora, Ill., wove an aura of curiosity about a show window decorated with new potatoes at \$6 a bushel. The spuds, jewelry like, reposed in beds of cotton, half covered with sanitary pajamas, and never batted an eye as throngs shifted their gaze from the fruit to the price tag.

The Elgin Watch company has just effected the largest group of settlements under the Illinois workmen's compensation law. About \$50,000 was disbursed among families of twenty employees who met death by diphtheria and typhoid fever through drinking polluted water from the artesian well of the company's factory.

A truly-for-sure home dry measure drafted by the attorney general has been submitted to the Kansas legislature. Should the bill become a law anybody caught bringing the demon into the state will be fined from \$100 to \$1,000 for each offense and from 30 to 365 days in jail. Corporations hauling the stuff are subject to the above schedule of fines.

Although 300 serious minded delegates to the women's department of the National Civic Federation in New York heard world-problems discussed, one silent woman commanded more attention than the orators. Miss Anne Morgan touched off a cigarette and the smoke curl sent to the ceiling caught the eyes of the crowd. It was the only snuff in sight.

Secretary Houston of the Department of Agriculture has just announced an apportionment of \$16,000,000 among the states for the purpose of encouraging good roads construction. Nebraska's share in this is \$213,541, the availability of which depends upon the activity of the state in road-building. A number of bills for new road laws have been presented to the legislature, but so far all have been on lines that will perpetuate the most undesirable features of the present system. Local control is one of these.

Obituary.
Jacob H. Smith died of cancer of the stomach at his home in Arnold, Neb., January 23, 1917. Mr. Smith was born at Hannibal, Mo., November 5, 1865, and moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Smith, from Illinois to this county, where he has made his home with the exception of one year spent in Minnesota in 1896. About eight years ago he spent one year at the Palmer School of Chiropractors at Davenport, Ia., where he graduated and received his diploma, then moved to Grand Island, where he followed the profession for a couple of years, but finally moved back on to his farm. He kept up his practice in the community until his health failed him. The latter part of August he moved to Arnold, Neb., to have better school privileges for his children.

Mr. Smith was married to Stella M. Dillon, of Garfield, November 13, 1889, to which union five children were born: Lloyd E., who died in infancy; Lyle D., of Grand Island; Myron A., William W., and Mabel Luella. Mr. Smith wed with the M. E. church at Garfield in 1891 and lived an exemplary christian life, always ready to help in whatever enterprise that made for the good of the community, and a staunch friend of the church. Beside the widow and children there are left to mourn his death four brothers Lewis, Marcus, Isaac, of Garfield, and Seymour F., of Callaway, also three sisters, Mrs. Abner Dillon, Mrs. Luther Claudson and Mrs. Lester Joy, all of Garfield. Also a host of friends and neighbors.

The funeral services were conducted at the Garfield church by Rev. Getty, of the Arnold M. E. church, who gave an excellent discourse, and the remains were laid to rest by the side of the infant son. Mrs. A. L. Auble.
