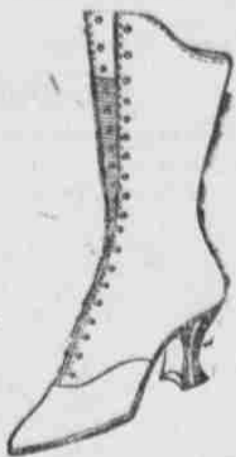

The car load of hogs shipped by the experimental substitution to Denver, and shown there last week, brought on the market \$2,245.07.
