HASTINGS MAN BUYS THE PAT THEATRE

Will Erect New Ice Plant.

As soon as the weather will permit, the Artificial Ice Company will erect another building just east of its present plant. This new building will be 30x80 feet with full basement and will be supplied with individual or unit refrigerating machinery, enabling the company to use one plant independently of the other. This admits of heavy output when business so demands, and a lesser production when trade is slack.

The new building will have several times greater storage capacity than the present plant. This feature of the business has increased as rapidly as has the demand for artificial ice. A considerable portion of the cold storage space will probably be used by the company in handling fruits and vegetables.

Circulation of Books Increases.

Report of the public library shows that there are now three thousand three hundred and seventy-nine borrowers, ninety-seven more than in 1916. During January there were two thousand two hundred and fifty-one books in circulation, an increase of one thousand one hundred and eighteen compared with January, 1916. The library rooms are visited daily by a large number of adults and many children and on Sunday afternoons the rooms are usually crowded. A number of new books have been placed on the shelves; among them are "A Pair of Blue Eyes" and "The Return of the Native," by Hardy; "Chloe Malone," by Lee; "Rising Tide" by DeLand and books on pictures and occupation.

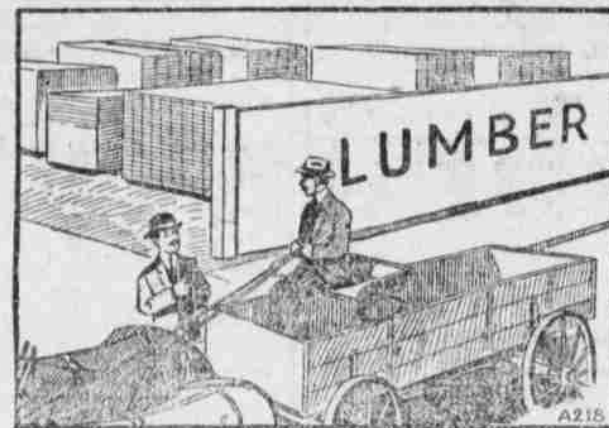
