UNITED STATES BREAKS RELATIONS WITH GERMANY.

What was generally expected has happened. Last Saturday President Wilson broke off friendly relations with Germany; passports were handed Count von Bernstorff, German ambassador to the United States, and Ambassador Gerard, American ambasto Germany was directed to ask for his passports. This does not mean a declaration of war, but it will probably result in such; at least history has proven that war follows such steps. All neutral na tions have been invited to join the United States in dissolving diplomatic relations with Germany, and this may finally result in a war in which practically all nations of the world may become involved

At the outset at least people of this country will not become hysterical over conditions, for so far as now can be seen a decia:ation of war only means sanding out our warships to pairol the seas and probably convey ships flying the American flag. This country will not semi troops to Germany, nor will Germany send troops here. Our factories will, however, bend thefir energies to making munitions of war, for ourselves instead of for the allies, which will be somewhat favorable to Germany. expected that our exports will be decreased and this may flatten out business in this country and cause a decline in prices.
