## How Nebraska Feels.

From the Fremont Tribune: "When we come to think of our own flesh and blood being shelled and left in real heaps before the engines of awful destruction, with their pallid faces turned to the sky and their eyes glazed and sightless, it is then the cruelty and horror of war come to us with crushing force. We then realize that there should be no word spoken in jest or in disregard of the solemn situation. We do not want war, for we love the boys and men who must be sacrificed and pay the awful price. We do not want war because it will leave the nation's manhood crippled and maimed and bind and the nation itself burdened with debt that must be paid with the sweat and toil and tears of the coming years. We must pay the price in material things with which we are so greatly blest, but when it comes to opening the very veins of the nation, let it not be done except when every possible expedient has been exhausted. This is how the people of Nebraska feel."

## Block Returns From the East.

H. I. Block returned Tuesday from a month's visit in New York and other eastern cities and in Montreal, Canada. Mr. Block's trip was for the purpose of buying spring goods for his store and he found the manufacturers very much rushed with orders, and asking to be given all time possible in making shipments. Prices are still ascending and this is particularly true of silk garments. He visited in Montreal and he could not help but notice the very large number of crippled men on the streets, nearly all of whom were soldiers who, having been on the fighting line, lost a leg or arm or both, and had been sent home. The Canadians were among the first troops England sent out against the Germans.

Mezeppa Lodge to be Reorganized.  
Plans for the reorganization of Mezeppa lodge No. 115, Knights of Pythias, were discussed at a banquet held at the Hotel McCabe Monday evening, George E. ## TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION WILL MEET HERE MARCH 29-31

The West-Central District Teachers' Association will meet in the Franklin Auditorium in this city Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 29-31. The first day will be given over to visiting the various schools of the city and the first session will be held in the evening. State Superintendent Mary C. C. Bradford of Denver, Colorado, and State Superintendent W. H. Clemmons of Lincoln, Nebraska, will divide the time in the evening. Friday evening Judge Ben Lindsey, of Denver, will deliver his world-famous address on the boy problem. Saturday Professor W. H. Foeltz, of the National Bureau of Education, will make two addresses on various phases of rural school development. Rural and city teachers from Buffalo, Dawson, Lincoln, Logan, Keith, McPherson, Arthur, Garden and Deuel counties will be in attendance. This is the Association which was called off last spring on account of the quarantine of the local city officials. The officers of the association are: Wilson Toot, North Platte, President; C. E. Collett, Goshute, vice-president; Alleen Gantt, North Platte, secretary; Frank Smith, Sutherland, treasurer.

## Bonds in Lump Sum.

To provide funds for paving street intersections where districts are in the future to be formed, it is suggested that fifty thousand dollar bonds be voted. If future districts are to be formed—and property owners seem favorable thereto—it is probably best to vote sufficient bonds at one time to cover several districts than to call a bond election each time a district is formed. To vote a lump sum would save election expenses and the bonds need be issued only at such times as required. This is the plan Kearney is now pursuing. At the coming spring election that city will vote on the issuance of \$50,000 for street intersections, Kearney, by the way, is doing wonders in the way of street paving, having this week created district number twenty-six.

## Cars Increase Rapidly.

County Treasurer Souder anticipates that the number of auto licenses issued in Lincoln county this year will not fall much short of two thousand. So far about 1300 have been issued, but many car owners have been dilatory in securing the 1917 license largely because they have not had their cars out of the garage since January first. It is probable that at least 300 cars will be sold to residents of the county this year. Five years ago there were ninety-one cars in the county.

## Boyer Case Continued.

The case of the State against Bori Boyer, charged with the unlawful sale of liquor came up for hearing in the county court Tuesday but was continued until tomorrow. The continuance was taken on account of the absence of Elmer Chass, to whom Boyer is alleged to have sold the liquor, and who is the star witness in the case.

## Nebraska Flag Law.

Whoever in any manner, for exhibition or display shall place, or cause to be placed, any word, figure, mark, picture, design drawing or any advertisement of any nature, upon any flag, standard, color or ensign of the United States or state flag or ensign of this state; or shall expose or cause to be exposed to public view any such flag, standard, color or ensign, upon which shall have been printed, painted or otherwise placed, or to which shall be attached, appended, affixed or annexed, any word, figure, mark, picture, design or drawing, or any advertisement of any nature; or who shall expose to public view, manufacture, sell, expose for sale, give away or have in possession for sale or to give away, or for use for any purpose, any article or substance, being an article of merchandise, or a receptacle of merchandise, or article or thing for carrying or transporting merchandise upon which shall have been printed, painted, attached or otherwise placed a representation of any such flag, standard, color or ensign, to advertise, call attention to, decorate, mark or distinguish the article or substance, or which so placed; or who shall publicly mutilate, deface, defile or defile, trample upon, or cast contempt, either by words or act, upon any such flag, standard, color or ensign, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both. The words, "flag," "standard," "color," or "ensign," as used in this subdivision or section, shall include any flag, standard, color, ensign or any picture or representation of either thereof, made of any substance, or represented on any substance, and of any size evidently purporting to be either of said flag, standard, color or ensign of the United States of America, or a picture or a representation of either thereof, upon which shall be shown the colors, the stars, and the stripes, in any number of either thereof, or by which the person seeing the same, without deliberation may believe the same to represent the flags, colors, standard or ensign of the United States of America. The possession by any person, other than a public officer, as such, of any flag, standard, color or ensign, in which shall be anything made, unlawful at any time by this section shall be presumptive evidence that the same is in violation of the section. (1905 p. 692; Ann. 2390; Comp. 7915b.)

## Looked Like a Mistake.

One of the big eastern structural companies, having a contract to build a traveling crane above a coal handling plant at a dock, decided to employ a surgeon to remain "on the job."
