### ADJUTANT GENL. HALL CALLS NEBRASKA REGIMENT FOR GUARD DUTY

### Captain Halligan Directed to Recruit Company E of this City to the Full War Strength

Adjutant General Hall, of the Nebraska Guards, issued the following statement late yesterday afternoon: "Eight hundred men comprising the Fourth Nebraska infantry, machine gun companies, etc., have been ordered out at once to guard places of national importance within the state limits. This is a general order in all states in the union. Appearances at Washington indicate that our nation is at this time in a critical condition and a general call to arms may be expected in the very near future.

The glee club will give a concert this afternoon and the educational banquet will be held this evening in charge of Miss Laura Murray. The Doan College glee club will furnish a program this evening.

## Wheat Fields in Band Shape

Federal Crop Inspector, Anderson, who has charge of field work in Nebraska, arrived in town Tuesday, and Wednesday in company with S. R. Derryberry and W. F. Snyder investigated wheat fields south and east of town. Fifteen or twenty fields were examined and found to be in rather bad shape. Mr. Anderson predicting that the loss from winter kill would be from twenty-five to fifty per cent in the fields that were examined. Wheat disced in stubble was found to be in better shape than that in corn stalks, and that fields sowed early were not in as good condition as those sowed late.

In the section of Nebraska south of the Platte river and from the Missouri river to Dawson county the loss from winter kill varies from fifty per cent to total. In many sections fields are being plowed and sowed to oats and barley.
