### PLEDGE UNITED SUPPORT TO WILSON AND CONGRESS

At the special meeting of the Elks Tuesday evening the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"We, the members of North Platte Lodge No. 985, B. P. O. Elks, in special session assembled, hereby pledge our loyal support to President Wilson and congress in any step deemed necessary to protect the lives and rights of American citizens and the honor of our country and its flag."

This resolution was read the same night to President Wilson, to Congressman Kinkaid and to the Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks.

The resolution was introduced by T. C. Patterson, who made an address favoring it, as did also Bishop Beecher, John E. Evans, Capt. Halligan, Exalted Ruler Keefe and others. On passage the assembled Elks stood and gave the voting sign, and the vote was without a single dissent.

Similar resolutions have been passed in the more than 1200 Elk lodges in the country which have a membership of over six hundred thousand.

### Lincoln-Brooks Wedding

A pretty home wedding took place Wednesday evening at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. W. Lincoln, when John E. Brooks and Minnie E. Lincoln, two popular young people of our city were united in marriage. About twenty guests consisting of the immediate relatives of the bride and groom were present.

The attendants of the couple were the bride's brother John Lincoln, Jr., and the groom's sister, Miss Margaret Brooks. A striking feature of the ceremony was the entrance of little Marguerite Lincoln, the three year old niece of the bride, bearing the ring in the heart of a great white lily. Mrs. H. A. Brooks played the wedding march and soft music on the piano during ceremony. Rev. A. C. Hull, pastor of the Baptist church, performed the ceremony after which a plate supper was served to the guests. Mr. and Mrs. Brooks will remain in North Platte for a short time but expect soon to remove to Gothenburg where Mr. Brooks will engage in the vulcanizing business in which he was formerly engaged in this city. Mrs. Brooks was formerly employed in the office of the Davis garage and for several months has held a position as stenographer with the Coates Lumber Co. Congratulations are extended.

### Bridge Election Tuesday.

Next Tuesday the resident voters of the recently created and consolidated Osgood precinct will vote upon the proposition to issue bonds in the sum of \$10,000 to aid in the construction of a new bridge across the river south of town. Supporters of the proposition seem confident that it will carry, although a few of the opponents have been busy working against and attempting to create a discord in the east part of the district.

The present bridge has about outlived its usefulness and a new bridge in any event must be built within a year or two. Under the present proposition Osgood precinct furnishes \$10,000, North Platte city \$10,000 and the state \$20,000. This certainly is an easy way to obtain a \$40,000 steel or concrete bridge—and personally we would favor the concrete.

### Men Wanted For Navy

Postmaster McEvoy received the following telegram Wednesday night: "Our country must have 40,000 men immediately for the navy. The president has called for full war strength. Nebraska must have 2000 men apply at once. Representative of the navy will be in your city April 16th and 17th and will examine and transfer men at government expense. We must have men now and while we expect Lincoln county to rally loyally to the colors all men should understand that the navy offers wonderful opportunity for a purely personal standpoint. Men must be between the ages of seventeen and thirty. Parents should come with young men if possible."
