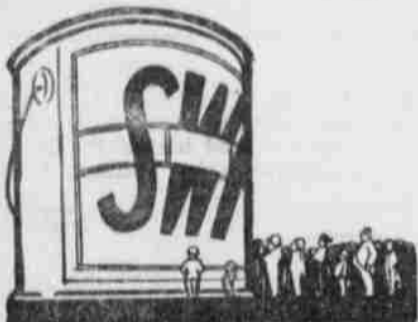

WALTEMATH WINS EASY; BOND ISSUES CARRY

MEHLMAN DEFEATS MOONEY IN SPIRITED FIGHT FOR CITY TREASURER

Day Elected Councilman in First, Howard McMichael in Second, Stone in Third and VonGoetz in Fourth

The city election Tuesday was a rather quiet affair, less than 1000 voters out of a total of 1700 exercising the right of suffrage. The only enthusiasm displayed was by the supporters of Roy Mehlman, candidate for city treasurer, a half dozen or more workers for him being in evidence throughout the day, and their efforts in his behalf won him the victory.

There was some work done by the friends of Henry Waltemath, candidate for mayor, but as between him and Hollman the contest was not very spirited and Mr. Waltemath won easily.

If there were features of the day, they were the big vote received by Major Dave Day for councilman in the First, and the defeat of VanCleave for councilman in the Second.

Particularly pleasing to the progressive element of the voters were the majorities received by the fire station bonds and the school bonds.

The vote in detail follows:

Mayor

Waltemath—First ward 156, Second ward 78, Third ward 140, Fourth ward 116, total 490.

Hollman—First ward 111, Second ward 104, Third ward 103, Fourth ward 165, total 423. Waltemath's majority 67.

City Clerk

For city clerk O. E. Elder had no opposition. He received 235 votes in the First, 152 in the Second, 214 in the Third and 192 in the Fourth, a total of 793.

City Treasurer

Mehlman—First ward 187, Second ward 192, Third ward 124, Fourth ward 145, total 558.

Mooney—First ward 84, Second ward 75, Third ward 125, Fourth ward 76, total 360. Mehlman's majority 198.

Water Commissioner

For water commissioner Hershey Welch with no opposition, received 233 in the First 155 in the Second, 215 in the Third and 176 in the Fourth, a total vote of 779.

Councilman

First ward—Dave Day 176, Julius Hahler 37, H. A. Brooks 52; Day's majority over both 86.

Second ward—H. R. McMichael 109, J. H. VanCleave 71; McMichael's majority 38.

Third ward—J. H. Stone 148, A. M. Lock 95; Stone's majority 53.

Fourth ward—V. VonGoetz 135, Jos. McMichael 83; VonGoetz's majority 52.

Bond Issues

For Fire House Bonds—First ward 168, Second ward 119, Third ward 171, Fourth ward 135, total 593.

Against Fire House Bonds—First ward 63, Second ward 37, Third ward 55, Fourth ward 58, total 213.

Majority for bonds 380.

For School Bonds—First ward 168, Second ward 113, Third ward 184, Fourth ward 135, total 500.

Against School Bonds—First ward 63, Second ward 49, Third ward 41, Fourth ward 58, total 211.

Majority for bonds 289.

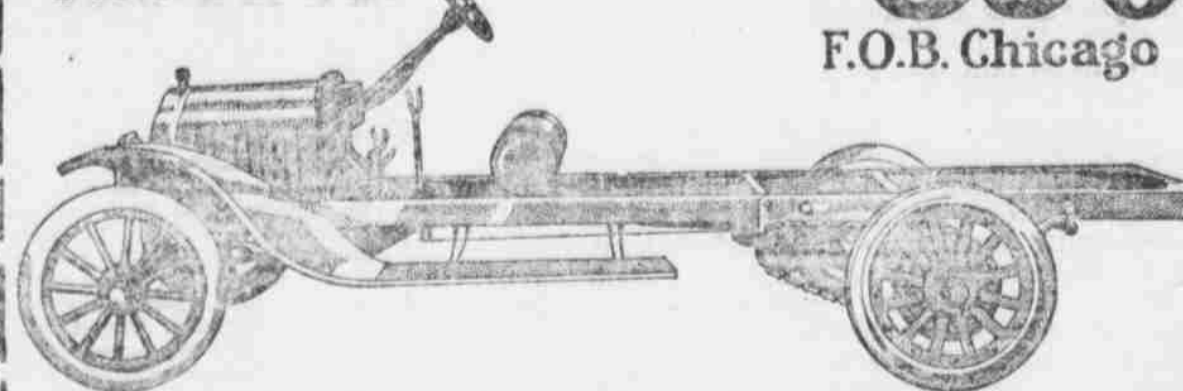
