WIRELESS STATION INSTALLED AT CLINTON'S JEWELRY STORE

North Platte has now a wireless telegraph station, but for the present, at least, its use will be confined to receiving corrected time from the national observatory at Arlington, near Washington, D. C. The plant has been installed by C. S. Clinton and the work of installation completed yesterday by F. L. Brittin, representing the Western Wireless Co., of Omaha, who for several years has been an operator in the United States navy. The aerials are strung on poles erected on the roof of the Habler block and on the roof over the Rexall drug store with the receiving wires stretched between the two poles. By the wave sounds corrected time will be received from Arlington twice a day, at 11 a. m. and 3 p. m. The telegraph code is recorded through the instrument placed in the store and received by the operator, who is not notified of the coming of the message but must have on the head receiver in readiness to receive it. Owing to war conditions the government will not permit the use of a transmitter, hence messages can not be sent. The first message was received yesterday, and it was found that the plant worked very satisfactorily. The distance between North Platte and Arlington is about 1900 miles.

STEWART COMPANY TO BEGIN DEPOT WORK AT ONCE

J. T. Stewart, president of the Stewart Construction Co., which has the contract for erecting the new depot, spent Friday in town looking over the site, preparatory to shipping in a big force of men. He announced that material is enroute and that work will begin in the immediate future. The building is supposed to be completed and ready for occupancy not later than October first. The foundation walls will be completed today or tomorrow, these having been constructed by the Union Pacific company, much of the work having been done by Ed Walker. The fact that the building is to be completed in six months necessarily means that a large force of workmen will be employed. Material is expected to begin arriving this week.

Entertainments Postponed. By reason of so many school events occurring in the Franklin auditorium this and next month, the committee having in charge the municipal entertainments has been forced to abandon them for some time. It was intended to hold a minstrel entertainment April 17th, but the school students give a black face entertainment April 20th, and the committee did not desire to in any manner interfere with the boys' entertainment. Ordinance No.

An ordinance fixing and determining the salary of the officers of the city of North Platte and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith: Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska: Section 1. That commencing with the municipal year commencing April 19, 1917, the salaries of the various and respective officers of the city of North Platte shall be as follows: Mayor, \$300.00 per annum. Each councilman, \$200.00 per annum. City Clerk, \$600.00 per annum. City Treasurer, \$200 per annum. Chief of Police, \$90.00 per month. Each patrolman, \$70.00 per month. Chief of Fire Department, \$250 per annum. City Attorney, \$600.00 per annum. Street Commissioner, \$75.00 per month. City Physician, \$150.00 per annum. Section 2. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law. Passed and approved this 4th day of April, 1917.

Elementary School Notes

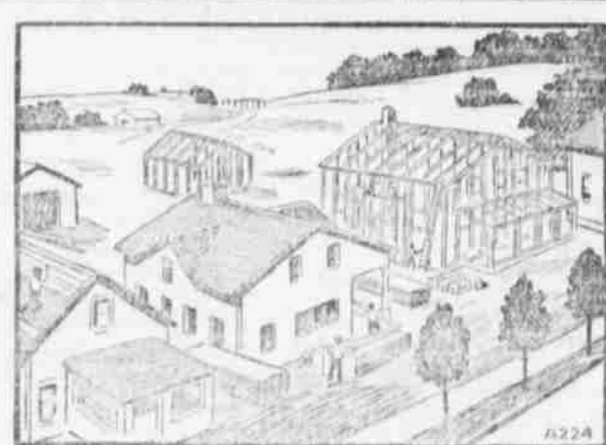
