YARD IMPROVEMENTS ARE BEING PUSHED RAPIDLY

Between sixty and seventy men, twenty of whom are colored, are employed on the terminal improvements which the Union Pacific is making in this city. These men are now at work laying tracks on the tract of land between the road bed and Seventh street and extending west from Wilcox street to the round house. Six tracks each approximately 2,000 feet in length have been laid and the ties strung for two more of equal length. These tracks are in pairs, and between each pair is a sufficient area for the storage of coal, and it is to this purpose that the ground will be devoted and for this purpose that the tracks have been laid, for this will be the coal storage yards in the future instead of using the yards east of the machine shops. By having the tracks in pairs the clam shovel, which is used to unload the coal cars, can be placed on a track along side the car to be unloaded. The sloughs are being filled, the Waldo outfit having charge of this work.

These 16,000 feet of track are only a small part of the yard improvement to be made, the total trackage to be laid aggregating over twenty miles.
