The high cost of construction is having its effect on proposed building operations in North Platte as well as elsewhere. The householder who burns anthra cite coal and has been paying \$12 to \$14 per ton for it in the past, is likely to be up against it next fall. A local coal man says that it is not going to be so much a question of price as it is whether it can be obtained this far west. If war conditions continue the price may ascend to about \$20 a ton-in which event base burn ers threaten to become practically obsolete.
