Withdraw Troops from East.

The demoralization of the Russian army and the consequent withdrawal of German forces from the eastern front are having their effect in France. The heavy re-inforcement of men and guns, which Field Marshal von Hindenburg has been able to throw into the defense of his sorely battered lines have, for the time being at least, caused a deadlock which the most furious effects of the British and French have failed to break.

The soldiers in the Russian ranks evidently have the bit in their teeth and it remains to be seen if there is a hand strong enough to check them from bringing about practical anarchy.

Russians Pass Through.

A trainload of Russian men, women and children passed west at noon Wednesday enroute to their native land. They were from New York and go to San Francisco thence by boat to Japan, crossing over to Manchuria, thence to Vladivostok, thence by rail to Petrograd. The trip will consume sixty days.

UNION PACIFIC EMPLOYEES TO BUY LIBERTY BONDS

The 41,000 employes of the Union Pacific System are to be welded into a giant force in the support of the government's Liberty loan.

This fact was made known today in a statement given out by President E. E. Calvin, who at the same time announced that the Union Pacific system had in its official capacity already subscribed for \$5,000,000 of the 3½ per cent Liberty loan issue.

The program for welding the army of the Union Pacific employes into a force to support the Liberty loan is contained in a personal appeal issued by Robert S. Lovett, chairman of the board of directors of the Union Pacific system, which reached President Calvin today in the form of a telegram. The chief feature of the appeal is the proposal upon the part of the Union Pacific system to purchase in the name of any of its employes Liberty loan bonds to the amount of 25 per cent of the employe's salary. The company will later deduct from the wage payment certain monthly sums to be agreed upon until the amount of the subscription is completed.—Omaha Bee.
