Mrs. J. O. Patterson, who was operated upon for appendicitis recently, is getting along nicely.

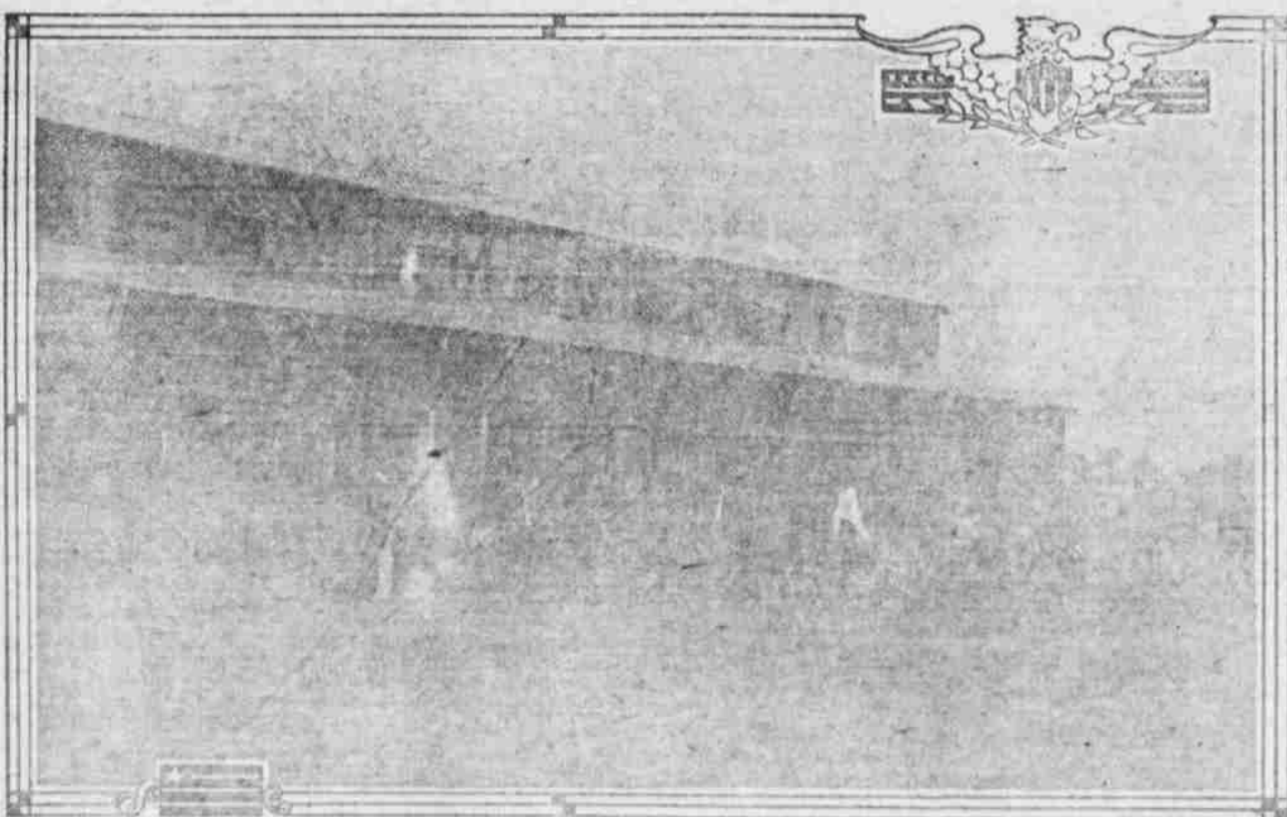
Mrs. Wood White returned Tuesday afternoon from Grand Island where she visited relatives.

**Nebraska Boys in War Time—
What the Y. M. C. A. will do for Them.**

The Association was a godsend to the boys "on the border"—ministering to their physical comfort; providing books, newspapers and sta-

tionery; furnishing games, lectures and entertainments; and offering opportunity of religious service.

The Association will do the same thing on a big scale in our war with Germany.

Three million dollars are needed for the first year. Of this, Nebraska

will raise \$50,000. The campaign for subscriptions is now being organized. Everybody in Nebraska will be given the opportunity to subscribe.

The slogan of the campaign is "Some Must Go—All Must Give."

Shipping a carload of potatoes with dry rot to the Lierk Co. and E. T. Tramp & Sons city, a shipper up in Oregon to get tangled up with the general government. These potatoes were received by the above firms a week or ten days ago and outwardly presented a very good appearance as sacks were opened. But after a few sales had been made the customers of the grocers began making complaint that half the potatoes were affected with inward dry rot. Then the sellers made an investigation and found that about fifty per cent of the potatoes in each sack were affected.

Upon this discovery Mr. Lierk communicated with Inspector Hecox, of the food commission, who examined the potatoes, and immediately wired to the state chemist W. S. Frisbie, who arrived Wednesday and also examined the potatoes, and made a report which he forwarded to the federal food division office at St. Paul, with certain recommendations. It is against the federal law to ship diseased potatoes from one state to another, and the Oregon shipper is liable under the law.

The Lierk Sandall Co. and Tramp & Sons had paid for the potatoes which with the freight amounted to about \$1500. They will probably bring a civil action against the shipper for the recovery of the money.

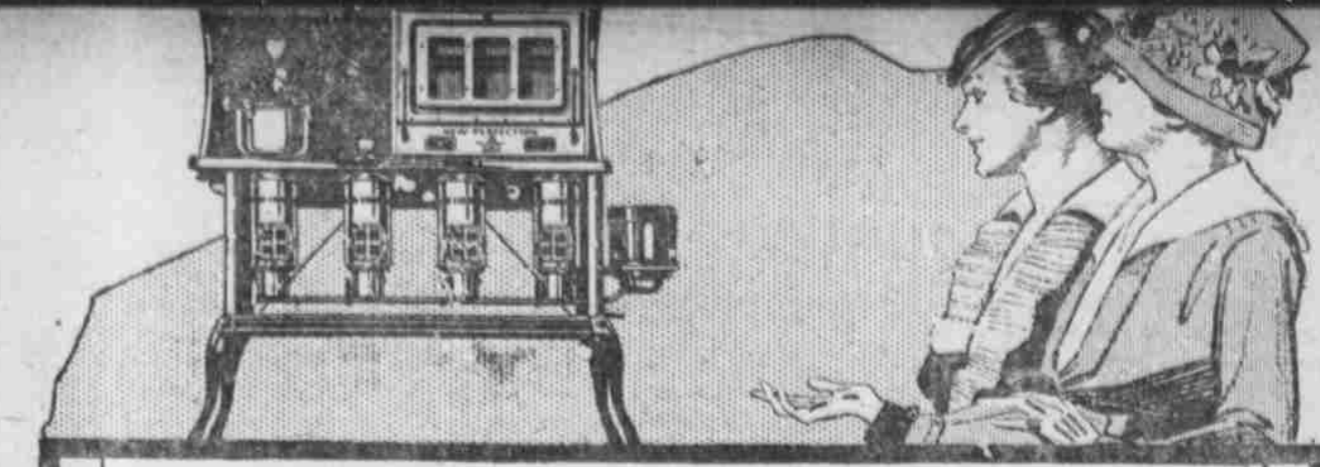
