Big Sale of Cattle

Over 900 head of Herford yearling steers and heifers, shipped in from Texas by Maurice Degan, were sold at the stockyards Friday afternoon, the sale amounting to about \$25,000. Practically all this young stuff was purchased by cattle growers living in Lincoln county or in the country tributary to North Platte.

This bunch of cattle distributed in this section, together with the 3,000 or more head shipped in and sold by Neale Turpie, C. H. Walter and others during the past nine months, means that this county is again coming into its own as a cattle producing county and that the thousands of acres of grass that has been going to waste for several years past will be utilized. These additions will go toward swelling the number of cattle in the county to seventy-five thousand head, which is about the number the county can support. On April first of last year there were sixty-five thousand head in the county as shown by the assessors' returns.
