40,000 Troops to Trenches

Forty thousand troops, under immediate command of General Pershing, and constituting the army, navy and marine corps, will be sent to the battle lines in France and Belgium in a very short time.

General Pershing and his staff will sail for Europe ahead of the troops to pave the way for final training of the huge army the United States is preparing to pour across the seas as rapidly as men can be trained and equipped.

Women Will be Taught Canning

Under the direction of the state school of agriculture a school for instruction in canning fruits and vegetables will be held in North Platte June 22d and 23d. Attendance at this school will be limited to those who pledge themselves to teach others how to can vegetables and fruits. Special attention will be paid to instructions in canning corn, tomatoes, beans, spinach and other vegetables, and attendants will be taught how to properly store potatoes, onions, apples, cabbage and beets.
