Red Cross Notes.

Because of the defense meeting being called for the federal court room last evening, the regular session of North Platte chapter American Red Cross will be held in the same room this (Friday) evening. Everyone come and hear the report of our delegate to the Conservation Congress, and help in our plans to make North Platte the most efficient Red Cross city of its size in our country.

The publicity committee acknowledges with thanks the printer man's sympathetic interpretation of its reports; however, all those who are contributing to the box of "comfort" please note that instead of the old socks we were made to ask for in Tuesday's Tribune, it is bed socks we want. These bed socks are for the sick and wounded being cared for at hospital bases. They may be knit or made of bath robe cloth.

Following is a list of articles suggested for filling the little comfort bags: Khaki colored sewing cotton No. 30, white sewing cotton No. 30, white darning cotton; needles No. 5, darning needles, buttons, khaki colored and white, medium size, in bags 3x5, blunt pointed scissors, cake of soap, safety pins, medium size, common pins, small comb, tooth brush, tooth paste, small round mirror, writing pad, envelopes and post cards, collapsible aluminum drinking cup, shoe laces, tan.

The other items which we are asking contributed are shoulder wraps of cutting flannel or bath robe cloth for convalescents. These can be sent in already hemmed or we will hem them if they come unfinished. We need for each one a piece of cloth 1 yard by 3 yards; and we can use any amount of handkerchiefs, napkins and tray cloths.

Then as mentioned before we want pieces of new gingham for making the "comfort bags" which are 19x13 inches when finished; and we can use any amount of freshly laundered old muslin and old table linen from which to make emergency handkerchiefs and napkins. We do not need them but we ask that such materials sent in be well ironed that they will pack well.

The committee will reach everyone in this city as soon as possible and it is hoped that there will be a liberal and prompt response to its appeal.

RAILROAD NOTES

U. P. Special Agent Watts returned yesterday morning from a business visit in the western part of this state.

Theodore Tottenhoff, who has been employed in Omaha for several months, returned here Tuesday evening to visit his family.

Roy Wallace formerly of this city, who has been employed in Cheyenne for several weeks returned here a few days ago to accept a position in the local shops.

Storage coal is now being unloaded at the new docks north of the main line and west of Willow street. It is said it is the intention of the company to store at least one hundred thousand tons during the summer months.

The tract of land owned by the company between Locust and Willow streets is being graded preparatory to laying a number of switch and storage tracks. Several additional lines of track are also being laid south of this new coal dock tracks.

Work on the new depot progresses rather slowly, due largely to inability to secure material. The concrete work, however, has been completed, the sheet piling and concrete forms are being pulled and a number of cars of brick have been received. Brick laying will begin in a short time.

To supply steel rails for the railroads on the west front in France, the Canadian government has stripped 135 miles of the Grand Trunk Pacific and twenty-five miles of the Canadian Northern, west of Edmonton, where these roads parallel. Government engineers have inspected these roads and have so arranged that all the towns and mines have still adequate transportation facilities.

WOULD BUILD ALFALFA MILL IN THIS CITY

George Lopez, of Denver, president of the Great Western Alfalfa & Milling Co., spent Tuesday in town and held a conference with the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and others at a luncheon at the Oasis. Mr. Lopez's company has erected a number of mills in Colorado, and proposes to build at least three in Nebraska at points where there is ample alfalfa grown. These mills cost \$15,000 and a working capital of \$25,000 is necessary, thus making an investment of \$40,000. Citizens of the locality in which the mill is located are expected to subscribe for one-third of this \$40,000 stock. The mill has a capacity of 12,000 tons annually.

A committee was appointed to investigate the company and the possibility of securing stock subscriptions.
