SUGAR FACTORY MANAGER LOCATES DRAINAGE SYSTEM

Genl. Manager Simmons, of the Great Western Sugar Co., arrived Tuesday and in company with O. E. Elder went to Hershey where right-of-way was obtained for a drainage system that will carry off the waste water from the expected sugar factory. This sewer system would start on the former Thompson farm now owned by George Mudd—the probable site of the factory—and running in a northeasterly direction for two and one-half miles, empty into the North Platte river. Part of the distance a 30-inch tile would be used, the remainder of the distance the waste water would flow through an open ditch.

The options secured on land for a factory site expire July 12th, and the people of Hershey and vicinity are awaiting with the interest that date in order to learn what move the company will make. Mr. Simmons stated that securing the right-of-way for the sewer did not necessarily mean that the factory would be built.

Home Photo Play Delayed.

C. D. Tinsley, who was here this week to obtain scenes for a home photoplay, fell short of films, and could not get all the scenes desired. He will be here about July 19th to complete the work. This will delay the production of the film until about August first. However, the show will be bigger and better by reason of this unavoidable delay.

Dies of Appendicitis

Edward Marquette, aged twenty-four and unmarried, died at a local hospital Tuesday of appendicitis. The deceased had been operating a harness shop at Hershey for a year or so past, and was stricken with the trouble. He was brought to the hospital last Saturday and an incision made, but it was found that conditions were such that an operation would not avail and that the patient was beyond medical assistance. The deceased was a brother to Fred Marquette who lives southwest of town. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon with interment in the North Platte cemetery.

A Wonderful Aboriginal City.

Near Laguna, N. M., may be seen Acoma, the "sky city," claimed to be the most wonderful aboriginal city in the world. It stands on an isolated rock eminence 400 feet in height. The city embraces three rows of houses over a thousand feet in length, rising up in terraces four and five stories. One is amazed when he steps to consider that the material for these buildings were transported long distances and up the cliffs upon the heads and backs of these human burden bearers. Their graveyard consumed forty years in building by reason of the necessity of bringing earth from the plain below, and their church must have cost the labor of many generations, for its walls are sixty feet high and ten feet thick, and it has timbers forty feet long and fourteen inches square.—Exchange.

A Story of Longfellow.

In Longfellow's journal, in which he chronicled daily things that came under his observation, he notes that upon a certain occasion he attended a church where the minister took as his subject "Progress." He was very flattered when the latter quoted about half of the "Psalm of Life." After repeating the verses the minister said, "I could never read that poem without feeling the inspiration with which it was written." To this incident Longfellow adds: "But I had the conceit taken out of me on the evening of that day, when I happened to meet a lady at Prescott's and in our conversation she referred to the sermon in the morning and added, 'He quoted some beautiful verses, but nobody knew whence came the quotations.'"

Traffic Suspended.

Traffic over the Lincoln Highway bridge was blocked at noon Tuesday when the fill at the west end of the structure caved in leaving a hole about thirty feet long and extending three-fourth across the roadway. This caving occurred just before noon. The cement wing on the north side went out at the same time, crumbling and dropping into the river, was buried out of sight in the seething current. At the time the wing went out the steel girder was moved eight or ten inches out of place and bent for a length of eight or ten feet. This girder will not, however, effect the bridge to any extent.

The state pays one-half the cost of maintaining the bridge, the county the other half, and this applies to such damage as has now ensued.

Big Time at Picnic.

Members of the B. of L. F. & E. and their families had a most enjoyable day at the city park Wednesday when they held a picnic. The sports began in the forenoon and continued until eight in the evening, basket dinner being served at noon. Among the sports was a ball game between employees of the Second and Third districts, in which the Third district men won. The game was very exciting and created lots of fun for the spectators. In the men's tug of war the Second district men won, and in the ladies' tug of war those of the Third district were given the prize. In addition to these events there were a number of other games of various kinds. Nearly 500 hundred attended at one time or another during the day and everyone had a very enjoyable time.

Sale of Hayes County Ranch.

The Hayes Center Times-Republican of June 28 says: Lark Doyle, one of the early settlers of Hayes county during the cow boy days, but who has been ranching up in Cherry county for a number of years, sold out his holdings for \$75,000 and came back to Hayes county and made a deal with R. B. Sheridan and purchased his ranch on the Willow northeast of town consisting of 2670 acres, also the cattle on the ranch, the consideration being \$70,000. The above deals were both cash. Mr. Sheridan gave Mr. Doyle possession of the ranch last week, and he and his wife have gone to Imperial to look after some land interests they have in Chase county. Mr. Sheridan expects to rebuild his McCook home and again live there.

Quick Work.

County Clerk Allen received instructions from Washington yesterday to furnish the governor, the adjutant general and the war department at Washington with copies of the Lincoln county registration list. This gave Mr. Allen one day to make out the list of 1700 names, together with the postoffice addresses and serial numbers. He was, however, equal to the occasion, and putting several typewriters at work finished the work last evening.

The Round-up at Ogalalla on the Fourth was attended by a very large crowd, the number of autos being estimated at 2,000 and the crowd at 10,000. The wild west stunts are reported to have been very good. Two or three hundred North Platte people attended.

The Russian army in Galicia is pushing the enemy strongly and fighting like demons. In the fighting of Sunday and Monday 300 officers, 18,000 men, twenty-nine guns and thirty-three machine guns were captured by the Russians, the war office announces.

David Scott appeared before the council with the request that he be allowed to pump gravel from the city pit in the Fourth ward the city to be supplied free with a certain percentage of the total pumped. No action was taken on the proposition.
