**AFTER PROTRACTED ILLNESS  
 GRACE OGIER PASSES AWAY**

Grace Ogier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Ogier, died shortly after midnight at the family residence Friday. Death followed an illness of eleven months, the greater part of which time she was confined to her room and suffered intensely. The devotion and care of loving relatives and friends and the attention of skilled physicians made less burdensome the sufferings which she bore patiently, but the nature of her disease was such that earthly aid was of no avail and the end came peacefully. The taking away of this young woman in the springtime of life brings sorrow to the hearts of the relatives and to the many friends who had known and loved her, and the fortitude with which she bore her illness is an example of a noble character and christian life.

Grace Almira Ogier was born, near Wallace, April 12th, 1896. She came to this city at an early age and attended the local schools where she was a favorite with her classmates and instructors. Later she graduated with honors from the Hastings business college and for several months assisted in the office of her father. About August 1st, 1916, she left for Guide Rock to visit with Miss Erma Scherbacher who had resided with the Ogier family and to whom she had become attached. While there her health failed and August 22d she was taken with her final illness and throughout this illness her popularity among the younger set was shown by the beautiful flowers which filled her room and the sentiments of sympathy which were extended daily.

She had always been an attendant of the Presbyterian church and Sunday school and had always felt she had her part there, and during the early part of her illness, at her own request, she was baptized and taken into the fellowship of the church. She was also a member of the Rebekah lodge. One trait of Grace's character was the ability to enjoy life as she found it and to gain from the living by the joy our Creator intended as a reward. While her years were few she enjoyed them as they passed, and left us knowing nothing but kindness.

In addition to the loving parents and brothers Raymond and Robert she is mourned by uncles, aunts and cousins to whom she had endeared herself. Throughout the long illness of the deceased her unselfish disposition showed itself in that there was never a murmur that would worry the loved ones and always that carefulness to protect other people.

The funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. B. A. Cran. The auditorium was filled with sorrowing friends and the floral tributes evidenced the esteem in which she was held. Pall bearers were Thurston Woodhurst, Cody Boyd, Harold Burke, Ralph Clabaugh, Ted Bogue and Harry Huffman. Interment was made in the North Platte cemetery.

Honorary pall bearers were Misses Dorothy Himman, George Hoxie, Fern and Zoe Watts, Erma Scherbacher and Adah Hatfield of Hastings.

**Mexican Killed in Storm.**  
 Manuel Ramirez, a Mexican aged thirty-five, was killed during the storm Friday night. He had been employed on the Henry Well farm west of town and in company with his brother, Pedro Ramirez, madethier home in the beet-tenders' shack. The men were in bed when the wind carried the shack away and the falling timbers crushed the body of the former who died a few minutes later from the injuries received. The funeral services were held at two o'clock Sunday afternoon from the Malone undertaking rooms.

**Florence Downs Passes Away.**  
 The remains of Miss Florence Downs of this city, who died in Denver, arrived here Saturday morning and funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Methodist church. The deceased was the eighteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Downs, and had been ill for a year past. The seriousness of her condition two months ago caused her to leave for Denver to take treatment. Death was due to tuberculosis. Her many friends in this vicinity will regret to learn of her demise in her early womanhood.

**Notice of Canning School.**  
 A series of canning schools will be held in the basement of the Franklin building beginning Thursday and Friday, July 12 and 13. The second canning school will be held July 16th and 17th, the third July 18th and 19th, the fourth July 20th and 21st and will continue until every one who cares to learn the "Cold Pack" method of canning has been able to do so.

There will be morning sessions only, which will begin at nine o'clock. Each person will furnish her own vegetables and also bring a medium sized pan, paring knife and spoon and jars for canning. Mason jars and rubbers can be purchased at the school.

The first morning two vegetables will be canned, either beets or beet tops and either peas or beans. The second morning either carrots or tomatoes will be canned and one of the following: rhubarb, gooseberries or cherries in order to demonstrate this method of canning fruit.

The fee for attending the school will be twenty-five cents. Anyone desiring to attend can do by notifying Miss Aileen Gantt.


