SOME FIGURES FROM THE UNION PACIFIC'S REPORT

The report of the Union Pacific railroad company for the year ending December 31, 1916, has just been filed with the state railway commission. The length of the road is 3,560 miles and the average investment per mile is \$32,243.49. The main line mileage is 1,827.59.

The company reports a total investment of \$622,673,355 and total assets of \$675,973,977. It has a capital stock of \$321,835,100 and paid during the year 10 per cent on its common stock and 4 per cent on its preferred.

The total dividend paid was \$26,210,900, of which \$4,495,832 was paid out of the surplus, which now amounts to 116 millions. The company has a funded debt of 192 millions. It is a heavy holder of securities in other roads and enterprises, 198 millions in roads affiliated with it, 125 millions in companies not affiliated and 18 millions in non-carriers.

The company purchased practically no new equipment during the year, adding but 25 units and retiring 1227 freight cars. The cost of the equipment retired was \$1,626,421, while the money spent for additions and betterments was but \$810,267.

The company owns 527 locomotives, 398 passenger cars, 10,836 freight cars and 178 work cars.

The value of the land grants unenclosed is \$13,560,000. The acreage is 960,000. The company was originally granted 18,560,577 acres and has sold 17,600,224. The amount realized was \$20,225,104, but the entire records are missing, presumably having been destroyed in a fire in Omaha in 1906. The total land grant to the road in Nebraska was 4,557,342, of which only 2,964 acres remain unenclosed.

The income of the company from operating revenue was \$68,663,373, and its operating expenses \$37,382,007. This was an increase of \$14,481,093, and gave a net revenue of \$31,304,366, or a net increase of \$8,567,250. Its non-operating income was \$20,013,613, an increase of nearly two millions. Its net income from all sources was nearly 40 millions.

The income was disposed of as follows: Paid in dividends \$21,765,068, invested in physical property \$3,221,216, passed to profit and loss \$14,417,309.

The freight revenue of the entire system was \$51,277,211, the passenger \$390,639, switching \$387,314, excess \$380,639, switching \$387,314, excess baggage \$162,618.

Notice of Canning School.

A series of canning schools will be held in the basement of the Franklin building beginning Thursday and Friday, July 12 and 13. The second canning school will be held July 16th and 17th, the third July 18th and 19th, the fourth July 20th and 21st and will continue until every one who cares to learn the "Cold Pack" method of canning has been able to do so.

There will be morning sessions only, which will begin at nine o'clock. Each person will furnish her own vegetables and also bring a medium sized paring knife and spoon and jars for canning. Mason jars and rubbers can be purchased at the school.

The first morning two vegetables will be canned, either beets or beet tops and either peas or beans. The second morning either carrots or tomatoes will be canned and one of the following: rhubarb, gooseberries or cherries in order to demonstrate this method of canning fruit.

The fee for attending the school will be twenty-five cents. Anyone desiring to attend can do so by notifying Miss Alleen Gantt.
