### A Superb Program

If money will buy, and it usually will, the 1917 Chautauqua program will be the best ever presented in North Platte. From the opening ensemble of the Althea players to the last oratorical jewel of Dr. Conwell's famous lecture, "Acres of Diamonds," no expense has been spared in the organization of this year's program. New tents, larger than last year, a larger platform and different seating arrangements are but three of the many improvements over last year.

The Chautauqua comes here after a tour of California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado. The season opened at El Centro, Cal., in the lower Imperial valley on April 20th; it will end at Wamego, Kan., on September 14th. This is the largest Chautauqua circuit in the world, over 140 towns being included. This city will see the same program given in Pueblo, Colo., at the famous mineral palace. At Fresno, Cal., the Chautauqua was the feature attraction at the world's famous celebration of Raisin Day.

Get your tickets at once and be ready for the opening notes of the Althea players six violins on Sunday afternoon. Listen particularly for Miss Ruth Freeman's violin. Miss Freeman was married to an American army officer about two weeks ago. The next day he departed for France. ### Second Call Soon

A Washington dispatch to the State Journal says that within a short time another call for troops will be made. This second call will be for five hundred thousand men and Lincoln county's quota will be about one hundred. Present indications are that this will be followed by a third within ninety days.

If the United States is to win the war, and Washington officials now hold to that belief, it will be necessary they say, to place not less than two million men in the field.

### GETTING READY FOR THE COUNTY FAIR IN SEPTEMBER

"Though storms partly wrecked our buildings," said President Pielsticker, of the county fair association yesterday—"the Lincoln county fair to be held the last week in September will be the best we have ever had. I base this claim on the fact that farmers throughout the county are showing their interest in the fair by already gathering their sheep exhibits, and will collect other exhibits as well, thus insuring a great display of agricultural products. We have arranged our racing program, and can confidently promise the people the best races they have ever seen in North Platte. Beginning next week carpenters will rebuild the grand stand along different lines. It will be considerably enlarged, and the rear will be left open so as to permit the passage of the wind in case of storm. The center will be divided into boxes, each accommodating four or six persons, and these box seats will be reserved and sold at a higher price than the ordinary seat. There will be about one hundred of these boxes. As soon as the grand stand is completed the new exhibition building and stock and hog barns will be constructed. The officers of the association are sanguine that the fair will be a very successful one."
