MRS. SOPHIA FEDERHOOF PASSES AWAY WEDNESDAY

Mrs. J. C. Federhoof, who was taken ill Saturday evening with gall stones, died at seven o'clock Wednesday morning. She had suffered with this trouble for a number of years and recently the attacks became more frequent and serious. The best of medical skill was obtained and her suffering relieved for a time but hopes for a recovery were abandoned. For several days before her death she had been unconscious, but a few moments before the end came she spoke a few words to the relatives at her bedside.

Mrs. Federhoof was a pioneer resident of this city, a woman who was loved and respected by every acquaintance, and whose desire in life was to do good for others. Her death will be deeply felt by her many friends. Three children survive her; they are Mrs. Amanda Huffman, Martin O. Federhoof of this city and Mrs. Clara J. Robbins, of Williamsport, Pa.

Sophia Meyers was born in Bremen, Germany, February 20th, 1852. Her girlhood was spent in eastern cities and she was married in Washington, D. C., to J. C. Federhoof, who died in this city eight years ago. After their marriage they made their home in Montoursville, Pa., and came to this city in 1881. Mrs. Federhoof was prominent in church work and took an active part in the work of the Lutheran aid society. The funeral services will be held at the Lutheran church at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon.

ORDINANCE NO. 92.

Being the General Levy of Taxes on the Property of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for Revenue Purposes, During the Fiscal Year, Commencing the Second Monday in August, 1917.

Be ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section 1. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska at the rate of five mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section 2. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of two mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the purpose of paying the interest and principal on the Twenty-five Thousand Dollar Sewer Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section 3. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the purpose of paying the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollar Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section 4. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Ten Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section 5. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of one-half mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest on the Twelve Thousand Dollar Fire Station Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section 6. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one-half

mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Twelve Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of one mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the purpose of paying the interest on the sixteen thousand dollar paving bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of six and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for general revenue purposes of said city for the fiscal year beginning the second Monday of August, 1917.

Section IX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of two mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the public library fund to be expended in the maintenance of the free public library of said city for said fiscal year.

Section X. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of two mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation to be expended for the maintenance of public parks in said city for said fiscal year.

Section XI. Taxes are hereby levied

on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of four and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the payment of the lighting of streets and alleys of said city for said fiscal year.

Section XII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of two and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof to be expended in the maintenance and flushing of sewers.

Section XIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of seven mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the fire department and the paying for fire protection for said fiscal year.

Section XIV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of two and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the cemetery fund to be expended in the maintenance and up-keep of the cemetery for said fiscal year.

Section XV. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
