Reject Bids for City Hall.

At the meeting of the city council Tuesday evening bids for the erection of the city hall were rejected because they exceeded the sum of the bond issue, which was \$12,000. The lowest bid was \$13,500. The plans of the building will be changed so that contractors may place a bid within the \$12,000.

The contract for laying sidewalks and crosswalks for the ensuing year was awarded to Edward Walker.

Ordinances authorizing the levying of taxes for the coming year were passed, and the remainder of the evening was devoted to allowing claims against the city.

Vic Halligan Appointed Captain.

Victor Halligan, who had been at the officers' training camp at Ft. Snelling has been appointed captain of Company L, Sixth Nebraska regiment. The appointment came through Governor Neville, and was made some time ago but it was first necessary for Captain Halligan to secure a release from Ft. Snelling. This release was obtained Tuesday and he reported at Omaha Wednesday.

With P. R. Halligan as captain of Company E, and Vic Halligan as an officer of the same rank in Company L, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Halligan have reason to feel proud of their two sons.

Keefe Returns from East.

J. T. Keefe returned Tuesday morning from a month's visit in the east, spending the time in Boston, New York, Washington, at the Norfolk navy yard and in towns in Canada. At Norfolk he visited with Evans and Sandall, who have since been assigned to a war ship. In Canada he had an opportunity to learn from some of the returned crippled soldiers the horrors of the European war. In the Canadian cities one meets these crippled soldiers at every turn.

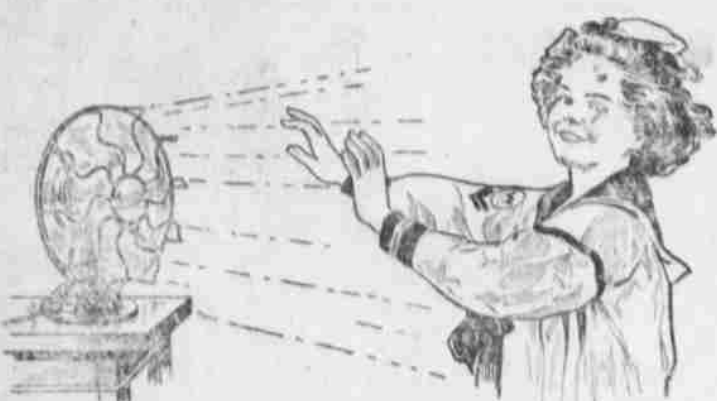

AIR PLANES FLY 150 MILES AN HOUR

United States army aeroplane experts are flying nightly from San Francisco to Salt Lake City in giant craft that travel with the velocity of comets, according to information given the Omaha Bee by persons who have seen the planes.

Plans for the development of a great fleet of heavier than air machines with which to begin the invasion of Germany and the central powers are said to have been perfected to a point that enables birdmen to make the trip in five hours.

Whether this means one way or the round trip is not known. One source of information declared the voyage from San Francisco to Salt Lake City and return 1500 miles, is being made regularly in five hours.

The presumption in this refers to the one-way trip between the two cities and would mean a rate of 150 miles an hour.

The planes are said to be at least three times the size of any other heavier than air machines ever used in the United States.

Each is equipped with tank capacity for gasoline sufficient to enable the machine to travel the entire distance without landing. Economy of consumption is said to be one of the main features of the new type of plane being developed.

Experts working on the machines are said to be confident that they have developed a war craft that will be able to fly from allied territory beyond the German border to Berlin and make the return in safety.

Sues for Breach of Contract.

In the county court this week Julius Pizer brought action against the Waltham Lumber Co. for breach of contract and asked for a judgment of \$125. The defendant company it was claimed by the plaintiff, orally agreed to furnish the plaintiff with steel girders for his building, failed to do so, and following the delay when the plaintiff purchased them the price of steel had risen and he had to pay \$125 more. The court, in accordance with the law, held that an oral contract in a sum of over \$50 was not binding.

ORDINANCE NO 91

Bill of Expense of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for the Fiscal Year beginning the second Monday in August, 1917.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated the entire proceeds of the occupation taxes, collected during the fiscal year beginning the second Monday in August, 1917, for General Revenue Purposes including salaries of said city officials.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of seven mills for the maintenance interest, to pay interest and principal for the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds heretofore issued by said city to be known as the Water Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of seven mills for the maintenance of the Fire Department, including salaries and fire protection for said fiscal year, to be known as the Fire Fund of 1917.

Section 4. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of four and one-half mills to provide and pay for the lighting of the streets and alleys for said fiscal year, to be known as the Street Lighting Fund of 1917.

Section 5. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's Occupation Tax on Fire Insurance Companies for the use of the North Platte Fire Department.

Section 4. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's maintenance of the Public Library in said city for said fiscal year to be known as the Public Library Fund of 1917.

Section 6. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of two mills, to be expended and used for amusements, for laying out, improving and beautifying city parks, and for the payment of salaries and wages of persons employed in the performance of such labor, to be known as the Park Fund of 1917.

Section 8. There is hereby appropriated the whole of the proceeds of said city's levy of two and one-half mills to pay the expenses of maintenance of the city sewers, including the expense of flushing the same during said fiscal year, to be known as the Sewer Maintenance Fund of 1917.

Section 9. There is hereby appropriated the proceeds of the income of the Water Department of said city for said fiscal year to be expended in the payment of salaries, expenses and maintenance, renewals and extensions of said Water Works for said fiscal year, and to be known as the Water Fund of 1917.

Section 10. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of one-half mill for Bridge Bond interest to pay interest and principal of the Twelve Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be known as the Bridge Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 11. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of one-half mill for Bridge Bond interest to pay interest and principal of the Ten Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be known as the Bridge Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 12. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of one-half mill for Fire Station Bond interest to pay interest and principal of the Twelve Thousand Dollar Fire Station Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be known as the Fire Station Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 13. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of one mill for Park Bond interest to pay the interest and principal of the Twelve Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be known as the Park Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 14. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of one mill for Paving Bond interest to pay interest and principal of the Sixty Thousand Dollar Paving Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be known as Paving Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 15. There is hereby appropriated all of the city's levy of two mills for Sewer Bond interest to pay interest and principal of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars Sewer Bonds heretofore issued by said city, to be

known as Sewer Bond Interest Fund of 1917.

Section 16. There is hereby appropriated out of the city's levy of six and one-half mills for General Fund, the sum of \$5,000.00, for bridges, culverts, streets, grades, drains, sidewalks and crossings.

Section 17. There is hereby appropriated all of the rest of and residue of the money derived from the said six and one-half mill General Fund levy, together with the moneys derived from the occupation tax paid during the said fiscal year and money derived from said fiscal year, and money derived from the police court, fines and costs, and interest on the city deposit, to be used for lawful expenses, to pay the salary of city officials, election, publishing fees, stationary, accidents, casualties, judgments, special engineering, and all of the items herein appropriated under sections 16 and 17, shall be known as the General Fund of 1917.

Section 18. There is hereby appropriated all of the city's levy of two and one-half mills to be expended in the maintenance and up-keep of the cemetery for said fiscal year, to be known as the Cemetery Fund of 1917.

Section 19. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

Passed and approved this 7th day of August, 1917.
